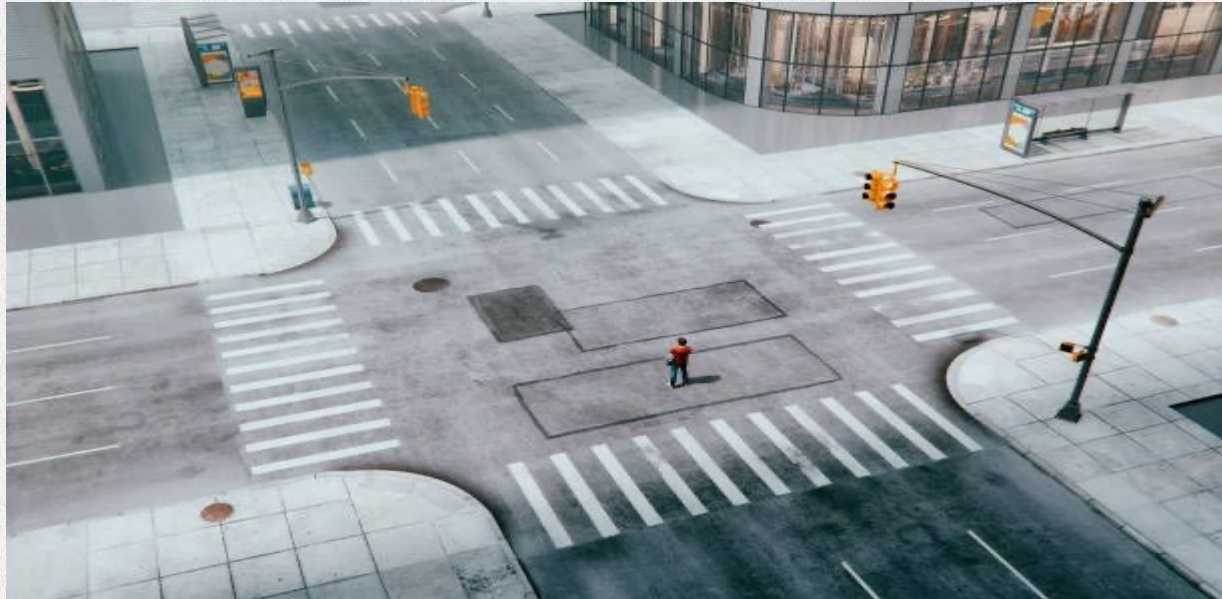

Eroding the foundation:

Profanity & Vulgarity

Profanity and vulgarity are becoming increasingly common, as are other sins of speech, and coarsening ways we are talking to each other- even as we have more ways to speak more publicly.

This is more and more common among Christians, and Christian ministers, influencers, and pastors.

Counter intuitive: Reasons for P&V

1. Courtesy- among people it puts at ease
2. Profession of strength- signal non-fragility
3. Not afraid of dirt- clean hands are no virtue in a fight
4. Escalation- you're not listening
5. Rebellion against false morality
6. Emotional expression- they're emotion words
7. Stigmatization- describing the profane and the vulgar

There are important reasons people use P&V. We don't need to be judgy. We need to be clear.

Jesus demands that we support human
dignity by the way we speak.

We are called to speak graciously,
truthfully, and to build others up.

We must not inadvisedly use profanity
and vulgarity

This will help us speak more
consequentially and constructively

**1. We must restrain profanity and
vulgarity and speak graciously to
build others up.**

6 quick reasons:

1. Weightiness- (Ex 20:7) don't use the Lord's name vainly, and don't give false testimony.
2. Reverence- "Hallowed be your name"- (Matt 6:9) my greatest hope is that God's name is revered.
3. Contrasting Example: Lady wisdom and folly- how they talk is a key difference between them.
4. Self-control vs. self-deception- James 1:26 If anyone thinks he is religious and does not bridle his tongue but [instead] deceives his heart, this person's religion is worthless (Jas. 1:26 ESV).
5. Contradiction- James 3- you can't have it both ways- to honor God and curse men. The fruit of real faith is godliness- in what we speak.
6. Self-revelation- What you say reflects your heart- Lk. 6:44-45 Each tree is recognized by its own fruit...For out of the overflow of his heart his mouth speaks.

What sort of things we talkin'?

1. Vain reference to weighty things- vanity, scoffing, flippancy
2. Swearing and cursing or as an oath (without need)
3. Quarreling and Grumbling (2 Timothy 2:14, James 5:9)
4. Contempt in judgment and personal insult (Matthew 5:21-24)

These are all pretty obvious extensions of the Golden Rule:
“Do to others as you would be done by.”

But what about more general Profanity and Vulgarity? What if I don't care if people use it- does that mean it's fine?

“Do not let **any unwholesome talk** come out of your mouths, but only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen.”

Profanity and Vulgarity

Ephesians 5:3-5

“But among your sexual immorality, or **any impurity**, or covetousness- none of these **should even be named among you, as is fitting** to saints, Nor should there be **obscenity, foolish talk or coarse joking**, which are out of place, but rather thanksgiving. For of this you can be sure: No immoral, impure or greedy person-- such a man is an idolater-- has any inheritance in the kingdom of Christ and of God.”

Colossians 3:8-10

“But now **you must rid yourselves** of all such things as these: **anger, rage, malice, slander and filthy language** from your lips. **Do not lie** to each other, since you have taken off your old self with its practices and have put on the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge in the image of its Creator.”

Ok, the Bible says it. But why does it?

**2. We must see profanity and
vulgarity as an erosion of dignity
and denial of wisdom.**

Premise 1: your speech matters

Proverbs 18:21

“Death and life are in the power of the tongue, and those who love it will eat its fruits.”

Proverbs 25:15

“With patience a ruler may be persuaded, and a soft tongue will break a bone.”

Premise 1: your speech matters

James 3:3-8

“When we put bits into the mouths of horses to make them obey us, we can turn the whole animal. Or take ships as an example. Although they are so large and are driven by strong winds, they are steered by a very small rudder wherever the pilot wants to go. Likewise, the tongue is a small part of the body, but it makes great boasts. Consider what a great forest is set on fire by a small spark. The tongue also is a fire, a world of evil among the parts of the body. It corrupts the whole person, sets the whole course of his life on fire, and is itself set on fire by hell. All kinds of animals, birds, reptiles and creatures of the sea are being tamed and have been tamed by man, but no man can tame the tongue. It is a restless evil, full of deadly poison.”

Premise 2: we need the lost virtues

Profanity is an action that denies the sacred status of its object or undermines the reverential affection something or someone deserves.

Vulgarity is any action that denies or neglects the dictates of wisdom or undermines the ordinate affection wisdom deserves.

Profanity and vulgarity will naturally increase and seem more justifiable as we forget their corresponding virtues.

Profanity

Irreverent, without regard for the dignity or sacredness of a thing.

Vanity

Scoffing, dismissiveness

Flippancy

Humiliates sincerity, earnestness, sacredness, reverence.

Reverence

Esteem, honor

To esteem something for its sacredness, worth or inherent dignity.

Reverence values immaterial and non-consumable attributes in something.

Vulgarity

Foolish, unrefined, ungoverned
Not in line with the dictates of
wisdom.

Classical: unrefined by
cultivation and philosophy
(stoics)

Biblical: not taught by wisdom,
folly, short sighted, morally
oblivious, inattentive to
consequences.

“common foolishness”

Prudence

Wisdom, excellence, governed
Desires to apply wisdom
appropriately having been
refined by growth, correction
and instruction.

Attentive to responsibility,
righteousness, foresight,
impact on others, and the
consequences broad and long
term.

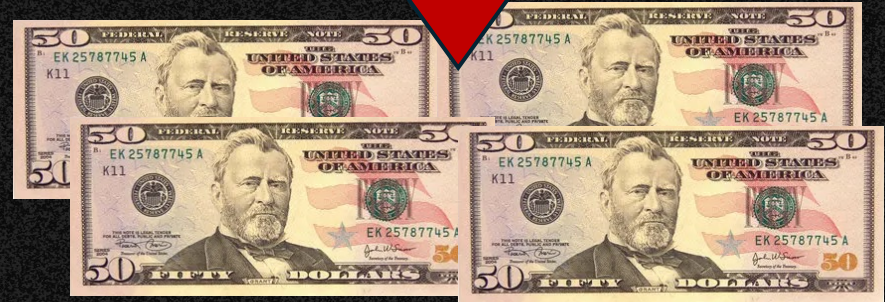

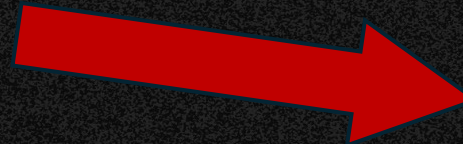

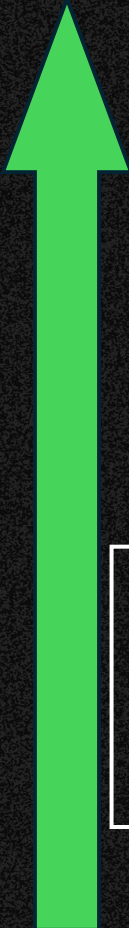

The long game

Corrosive

Vulgarity and Profanity are corrosive to human sanctity and dignity. They erode the foundations of our personal and social strength through the incredible power of our speech.

Constructive

Reverence and Prudence are the foundations of establishing human sanctity and dignity. They build the foundations of nobility and liberty. They express wisdom and honor, through the power of our words.

3. Speak graciously, constructively, and powerfully

Graciously and Constructively

Ephesians 4:29

Do not let any unwholesome talk come out of your mouths, but **only what is helpful for building others up according to their needs, that it may benefit those who listen.**

Powerfully

Acts 8:19-23 “[Simon]... offered them money and said, ‘Give me also this ability so that everyone on whom I lay my hands may receive the Holy Spirit.’ Peter answered: ‘May your money perish with you, because you thought you could buy the gift of God with money! You have no part or share in this ministry, because your heart is not right before God. Repent of this wickedness and pray to the Lord. Perhaps he will forgive you for having such a thought in your heart. For I see that you are full of bitterness and captive to sin.’”

Powerfully

Our words are more powerful and consequential when we reject profanity and vulgarity- when we chose our words carefully and speak with confidence and self-control.

We can become more adamant, more powerful, more consequential – and more focused. Our words will be more penetrating, apt, and likely to persuade.

Stoning of Stephen
