Luke's Journey towards Jerusalem:

Luke 9:51 (NASB95)

When the days were approaching for His ascension, He was determined to go to Jerusalem;

Luke 13:22 (NASB95)

And He was passing through from one city and village to another, teaching, and proceeding **on His way to Jerusalem**.

Luke 17:11 (NASB95)

While **He was on the way to Jerusalem**, He was passing between Samaria and Galilee.

Luke 19:28 (NASB95)

After He had said these things, He was going on ahead, going up to Jerusalem.

Jesus' Teaching on the Attitude of a Disciple	
Luke 17:7–14 (NASB95)	
⁷ "Which of you, having a slave plowing or tending sheep,	
will say to him when he has come in from the field, '	
Come immediately and sit down to eat'?	
⁸ "But will he not say to him, 'Prepare something for me	
to eat, and properly clothe yourself and serve me while I	
eat and drink; and afterward you may eat and drink'?	
⁹ "He does not thank the slave because he did the things _	
which were commanded, does he?	
¹⁰ "So you too, when you do all the things which are	
commanded you, say, 'We are unworthy slaves; we have	
done only that which we ought to have done.' "	

Thought questions:

- 1. What does the context of these verses suggest about my attitude toward my culture & my world?
- 2. What does the fact there are only two characters: One Servant / One Master, suggest about my attitude towards other people in my life (Family, church members, co-workers, neighbors)
- 3. What does the change in verse 10, referring to the disciples no longer as masters but as servants, suggest about my identity and my responsibility?
- 4. Thinking of other scriptures in the gospel, how does God differ from every other master, including the master in the story?
