

Questions

1. How does God's work through men like Adam, Noah, and Shem help us see the necessity of God sovereignly choosing to bestow grace on sinners?
2. Read Genesis 9:25-27. What outcomes did God promise for descendants of Noah's three sons? Read Psalm 24:1-2. What must we remember about the ownership of the earth and the owner's right over it?
3. Read Revelation 7:9. How remarkable is this vision considering the vast scattering of humanity by geography and language (as seen in Genesis 10)? How does this help you think about the importance of evangelism (consider Matt 28:19 and Acts 1:8)?
4. What did Nimrod have in common with Cain (cf. Gen 4:17). What often consumes those who are enemies of the LORD? How can that help us think about our own priorities?
5. What are some of the Bible's examples of Satan-driven attempts to prevent the seed of the women (Genesis 3:15) from appearing? How does God's preservation of His perfect plan give you assurance about hardships and sufferings that might otherwise tempt you to question Him?
6. What does Genesis 10 show us about the unity of humanity? How are you striving to live in the good of that unity?

The Table of Nations

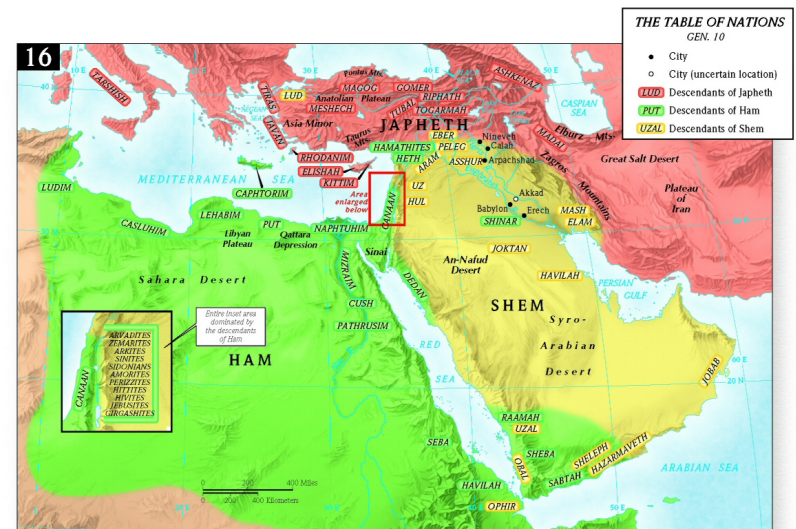
Genesis 10:1-32

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While Genesis 10 is meant to show how the nations of the earth spread out from the line of Noah, as God re-populated the earth, it also had a specific aim for the audience of Moses who first heard this record, along with two other key purposes for the people of God today.

1. Genesis 10 reminds us that Yahweh is Lord over the earth and has the sovereign right to do with peoples and nations as He sees fit.



3. Man's essential unity should foster humility and brotherly love among God's people.

2. God's authority in scattering the nations according to His own design should foster trust among His people.
