How Long, O Lord?

Habakkuk's Song Part 2 Habakkuk 3:3-15 March 10, 2024

You went out for the salvation of your people, for the salvation of your anointed. - Habakkuk 3:13

I. THE LORD, THE DIVINE WARRIOR

- Habakkuk recounts the Lord's works as Creator and Judge.
 He is viewed as leading his people out of bondage in Egypt.
 The image is of one watching the advance of the Lord as a
 Theophany (Deut. 33:2; Judg. 5:4-5).
- Pestilence and plague follow the Lord as his attendants. The ancient curses of the covenant will fall upon the Lord's people (Vs. 4-6; Lev. 26:25; Deut. 28:21-22).
- The Holy One of Israel will strike down first the ungodly in Israel, and then the pagan Babylonians without partiality (Rom. 2:9-10; 1 Pet. 4:17).

II. GOING OUT FOR SALVATION

- God is aroused to defend his people. The history of our world is the history of God's plan of salvation (Vs. 13; Gen. 3:15; Rev. 7:9-12).
- God is active in our salvation, not passive. He is not waiting
 for his people to decide. He has acted in history, ancient and
 near, to bring us to himself. Salvation belongs to the Lord
 (Ps. 3:8; Jonah 2:9; Rom. 8:31-39; Rev. 19:1-2).
- The term "your anointed" in vs. 13 is debated. It likely refers to King Cyrus, the Persian king who would subdue Babylon. It also speaks of a coming anointed one who will restore God's people in the fullest redemptive manner (Isa. 45:1; Matt. 1:20-25; Heb. 9:26-28).
- The security of God's people depends upon God's great acts of judgment and redemption throughout the ages by the Savior who was called from the foundation of the world (1 Pet. 1:18-21).

KNOW: God has "gone out" for the salvation of his people. He saved Israel so that he might bring forth his anointed from them, who will be their salvation and ours.

DO: Rejoice that God has planned your salvation from eternity past, and has worked all things toward that end.
