6. Anxiety, tension, guilt, and frustration (*Matthew 18:34-35*)
7. Inability to make wise decisions in light of ultimate goals (*1 Timothy 1:5*)
8. Fears (*Proverbs 28:1*)
9. Unable to concentrate (*Psalms 38:14; James 1:8*)
10. Small circle of friends (*Proverbs 18:4*)
11. Depression and fatigue (*Proverbs 20:27; Psalm 32:1-4*)
12. Judgmental attitudes (*Romans 2:1-3; Matthew 7:1-5*)
13. Self-condemnation (*Proverbs 8:36; 11:9*)

How a Clear Conscience Affects You

1. Mark of maturity (*Hebrews 5:13-14*)
2. Spiritual exercise of the inner man (*Acts 24:16*)
3. Freedom to rejoice in everything (*2 Corinthians 1:12*)

4. Number one weapon next to faith for overcoming Satan and sin (*1 Timothy 1:18-19*)
5. Freedom to share faith with boldness (*1 Peter 3:15-16*)
6. Better health and physical appearance (*Psalms 32:1*)

Reasons to Have a Clear Conscience

1. God's Word commands it.
2. It brings release from bondage and conflict.
3. It is a channel through which love flows.
4. It brings about development and growth.
5. Without it, the ability to discern between right and wrong is gone.

Biblical Parameters for Confession

1. The scope of the confession should be as large, but only as large, as the transgression.
 - a. Private sins should be confessed privately.
 - b. Personal sins should be confessed personally.
 - c. Public sins should be confessed publicly.
2. Do not apologize or just say, "I'm sorry." Say, "Will you please forgive me?"
3. When obeying . . .
 - a. In person is usually best.
 - b. The phone is the next best option.
 - c. A letter is the last and least effective.
4. Do not reflect negatively on another person.
5. Put the hardest person on your list first.
6. Don't expect an overwhelmingly positive response.

Obstacles to Obtaining and Maintaining a Clear Conscience

1. "It happened a long time ago."
2. "They have moved away."
3. "It's such a small thing."
4. "Things have gotten better."
5. "It will cost me money."
6. "I'll do it later."

the gift of repentance

Ask God to use the following questions to show you whether your heart attitude toward God is one of repentance from sin and from dead works of the flesh that cannot please God.

REPENTANCE FROM SIN

"Repent, and turn from all your transgressions, so that iniquity will not be your ruin" (Ezekiel 18:30).

1. **Do I have a heart attitude** that says, "Lord, everything I now know to be sin, and everything You show me in the future to be sin, I am willing to give it all up for Your sake"?
2. **Have I ever experienced** the repentance that characterizes genuine salvation? Was my conversion experience mere external reformation rather than internal heart transformation?
3. **Can I truly say that I am willing** to forsake every sin in my life, including those which are not known to others?
4. **Am I willing to call my wrongful acts sins**, rather than characterizing them as weaknesses, flaws, or personality traits?
5. **Am I more grieved over how my sin** has offended a holy God (repentance) than I am over the consequences that I have reaped for my sin (remorse)?
6. **Am I willing to accept personal responsibility** for my actions without pointing the finger of blame at anyone else?
7. **Am I willing to take whatever steps** may be necessary to make complete restitution for my sin?
8. **Am I willing, if necessary, to confess** my sin publicly before men as well as privately before God?
9. **Am I willing to face the possible consequences** of public repentance, such as loss of reputation, position, or influence?
10. **Am I willing, if necessary, to suffer the loss** of all things in exchange for being clean before both God and man?
11. **Am I willing to voluntarily yield privileges** and positions of leadership in order to demonstrate a repentant spirit?
12. **Am I willing to submit to the disciples** of man for my sin, as well as those consequences directly imposed by God?
13. **Am I willing to be accountable** to another believer in those areas of my life where I have experienced past failure, in order to develop new patterns of victory?
14. **Have I at any time in the past year** experienced genuine repentance, resulting in a change of actions, attitudes, and spirit? Have I experienced genuine repentance at any time since my conversion? Can I specifically illustrate repentance out of my life?
15. **Am I willing to testify openly** concerning where God found me before I repented?
16. **Are there any specific sins in my life** that I have never truly repented of? Am I willing to repent of those sins here and now? (Why not take time right now to list those sins on a separate piece of paper, and confess them with the intent to forsake them? As you do, exercise faith in the power of God to set you free from every sinful bondage.)

REPENTANCE FROM DEAD WORKS

"How much more shall the blood of Christ . . . cleanse your conscience from dead works to serve the living God?" (Hebrews 9:14).

1. Is my **profession of faith** a dead work that needs to be repented of? Was my acceptance of Christ an empty formality rather than a yielding to His lordship in genuine faith?
2. Is my **worship** a dead work to be repented of? When I sit in services or listen to the preaching of God's Word, do I allow my mind to wander to temporal interests and concerns?
3. Is my **giving** a dead work to be repented of? Do I ever give because I feel obligated to do so or in order to be noticed or appreciated by others?
4. Are my **prayers** a dead work to be repented of? Do I use the same phrases, the same wording, without thinking about what I am saying? When I pray in public, am I more conscious of the people around me than of God in heaven? Do my public prayers cover up an essentially prayerless lifestyle?
5. Is my **singing** of hymns and spiritual songs a dead work to be repented of? Do I glibly sing words that in fact I do not really believe or practice? Do I join in singing as a matter of habit rather than a matter of wholehearted worship?
6. Are my **acts of kindness** a dead work to be repented of? Do I expect or seek recognition for my "sacrificial" labors and efforts? Do I get offended when others are praised for their efforts and mine are overlooked?
7. Is my **service for God** a dead work to be repented of? Do I expect God to bless me because of all the work I do for Him? Do I serve God because that is what is expected of me rather than out of a heart overflowing with love and gratitude? Is my service a matter of mere human effort rather than being empowered by the Spirit of God?
8. Is my **witnessing** a dead work to be repented of? Do I witness without any real heart concern or compassion for the lost? Do I witness more for the purpose of adding up converts than for the glory of God? Do I witness in dependence on my own ability and effort rather than in dependence on the power of the Spirit?
9. Is my **public ministry** a dead work that needs to be repented of? Do I neglect earnest prayer and heart preparation in relation to my public ministry? Do I seek to please or impress others by my public ministry rather than seeking to be approved by God? Do I take credit for myself rather than giving all the glory to God for that which He does through me?
10. Am I **harboring secret sins** that render my kingdom efforts powerless? Do I ever give or pray while refusing to forgive another or failing to deal with an unresolved conflict? Do I encourage others to walk in the Spirit, while my own daily walk is dry, barren, and unfruitful? Am I guilty of putting on a smiling appearance while masking an empty, self-righteous, critical, or angry spirit?
11. Am I serving in the energy of the **flesh** rather than in the power of the Spirit? Am I content to produce that which is humanly explainable rather than that which can only be attributed to the supernatural power of God?

Biblical Prayers for the Pastor Search Committee

1. Pray for deep spiritual cleansing and fullness of the Holy Spirit in each team member. (Psalms 66:18; John 15:5; Ephesians 5:18) Pray this for each member by name.
2. Pray for keen supernatural discernment, wisdom and strength for the team chairman. (Matthew 15: 14)
3. Pray for powerful unity and oneness of spirit within the team. (Amos 3:3; Matthew 18:19)
4. Pray for God's clear direction in how resumes are collected, examined and interviews conducted. Ask God to bring the right person to the attention of the team. (Proverbs 14:12; Isaiah 55:8 -9)
5. Pray for the search team to have God's wisdom in all the questions and information they share with the prospective pastor. Spirit-led thoroughness is essential!(1 Corinthians 2:10 -16)
6. Pray for the team to have supernatural wisdom as to the unique characteristics and traits most needed for our church.
7. Pray for the team to have no timetable but God's. They must be determined to find God's perfect will in God's perfect time. (Ephesians 5: 17)
8. Pray for the future pastor and his family to have absolute certainty in their sense of call to our church. (He must know he has God's direction.)
9. Pray for the prevention of Satan's influence in misleading or rushing the search team. (One of Satan's wiles is deception.) Pray for a powerful hedge of protection around the committee and their families.
10. Pray for God's guidance in how the future pastor is presented to the church. Pray for the church to have a supernatural unity in his call to our church. (1 Corinthians 1:10; Acts 2:1) Pray for God's strength and guidance in the pastor's former church.

Biblical Prayers for the Congregation

1. Pray the pastor search period will be a time the church learns to seek God Himself more than just a new pastor. Lord, teach us to draw closer to Jesus and trust Him as the true head of the Church. (Jeremiah 29: 13; James 4:8)
2. Pray for a powerful move of congregational cleansing and renewal. Father, please cause this to be a time of deep healing, cleansing and renewal in our church. (Psalms 66:18; 139:23-24)
3. Pray for strong consistency and focus in the present ministry of the church. Please grant great power to our interim pastor and to our staff. Protect us from any spirit of lukewarmness or losing our first love. Remind us that we serve Jesus, not a pastor. (Revelation 2: 1-4; 3: 15)
4. Pray for a miraculous sense of love and unity among all members of the church. Help us surrender all bitterness, division and anger within our church family. Lord, empower us to love one another with a patient, forbearing love. (John 13 :34; 17:21)
5. Pray that we will patiently await God's timing and settle for nothing less than His perfect will. Ask God for His mercy in giving us a true man of God and a great leader. (Hebrews 6: 12)
6. Pray that we be prepared to make the necessary changes to embrace a new day of ministry. Lord, we understand that a new pastor always means
