PASTOR'S LETTER

Dear friends.

The psalmist long ago wrote, "One generation shall laud your works to another, and shall declare your mighty acts." (Psalm 145.4)

When the psalmist first penned those words, God's people had been declaring God's mighty acts for generations already. They

had passed on through oral tradition the stories of God's faithfulness from creation, through covenants after the flood and with Abraham and Sarah, through the exodus journey, and the through the journey of exile and return. As the stories were recorded and the scriptures were collected, they became central to the worship life of Israel in Temple, synagogue, and at home. "One generation shall laud your works to another, and shall declare your mighty acts."

The early church added its witness as new generations experienced and declared God's mighty acts even as they remembered and celebrated the witness of God's people who came before them. To this day, when the church gathers for worship and engages in service to one another and the world, we engage in acts of memory and witness. "One generation shall laud your works to another, and shall declare your mighty acts."

This week the acts of remembering and declaring are especially powerful. This past Sunday, October 29, we presented our pledges in worship as an ongoing act of participation and commitment to God's mission in the world. Our gifts declare God's mighty acts in concrete ways locally, nationally, and internationally. Our pledges and contributions are joined with the witness of those generous First Presbyterian members who left legacy gifts that continue to transform lives and impact the world. "One generation shall laud your works to another, and shall declare your mighty acts."

Wednesday, November 1, is All Saints Day. We gather to worship as a community of faith at 7 p.m. to remember by name First Presbyterian members who have died in the past year, as they have now joined the great cloud of witnesses that surrounding us in our own lives of faith. In this service, the psalmist's words are especially poignant. "One generation shall laud your works to another, and shall declare your mighty acts."

What a profound gift that God has called us all together as the community of First Presbyterian Church at this time. God has woven our journeys together with one another, and with those who have gone before us. And God is continually at work forming new relationships in our community of faith. Take a moment this week to voice your own prayers of thanksgiving for God's leading and guiding in your life that has led to being part of First Presbyterian Church and its legacy of faithful witness. And, if you have not yet made your pledge for 2024, consider doing so as a sign of your gratitude for God's call on your life through this community of faith.

On Friday, November 17, you are invited to A Family Night of Silent Film and Organ Music at 7 p.m. in the Sanctuary. Watch the silent film adaptation of *The Phantom of the Opera*, with live musical accompaniment by organist Peter Krasinski.



Peter Krasinski is a conductor, organist and music educator, whose imaginative and energetic performances elevate and inform diverse audiences. Along with regular concert appearances, he specializes in live improvised silent film accompaniment. He has premiered the art in major venues in North America, Europe and Asia. He is the recipient of a number of

prizes including the First Prize in Improvisation from the American Guild of Organists National Competition.

House Organist of the Providence Performing Arts Center, Mr. Krasinski was past Dean of the Boston Chapter AGO. He is Organist at First Church of Christ, Scientist in Providence RI, accompanist at Beth El Temple Center in Belmont, MA and recently presented Master Classes at the Sibelius Academy, Helsinki, Finland. He holds both a Bachelor of Music Degree in Music Education and Organ Performance, and the Master of Sacred Music Degree from Boston University.

This event is free and open to the public, and is cosponsored by Fort Worth Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. All age groups are invited to come and enjoy an evening of silent film and popcorn!

Advent Devotional Groups begin November 30

I know a man of such mildness and kindness it is trying to change my life. He does not preach, teach, but simply is. It is astonishing, for he is Christ's ambassador truly, by rule and act. But, more, he is kind with the sort of kindness that shines out, but is resolute, not fooled. He has eaten the dark hours and could also, I think, soldier for God, riding out under the storm clouds, against the world's pride and unkindness with both unassailable sweetness, and consoling word. (from Devotions: The Selected Poems of Mary Oliver; p. 134.

Mary Oliver's brilliantly crafted words have provided respite and inspiration to many people in our frantic world. The Salt Project has produced a companion to Mary Oliver's poetry for Advent. Each week of Advent, the study offers scripture, poetry, reflection, prayer, hymns, and daily practices. You are invited to join a group to share in this Advent preparation for Christmas.

Groups will meet on Thursdays, November 30, and December 7, 14, and 21. You will need to purchase or borrow Mary Oliver's book Devotions. Spiritual Direction: "A Lamp Unto My Feet..."

"Spiritual Direction has led me to greater clarity and focus. My SD has been able to take my many threads of swirling words and thoughts and bring them together, most often in a way I am too close to see. She has helped me discover particular spiritual disciplines that have helped lead my mind to a calmness, clarity and focus. When I find I am in the midst of a confusing wilderness, my SD is a gentle attendant on the path with me, enabling me to see Christ's presence."

"During a difficult time in my life I have found comfort, love, encouragement, strength, hope, and healing in gathering with another who seeks God's presence in all peoples and circumstances. It has been life affirming and life changing. I am so grateful!"

"Each month since 1998, I have seen the same spiritual director. With her gentle smile, her loving spirit, and her welcoming eyes, she has listened and reflected and prayed with me. That gift of listening - just listening - continues to be an exquisite gift for which I am deeply grateful. She exemplifies the phrase, "at the service of the directee."

So what is this spiritual direction these church members speak about? Simply put, it is "the opportunity to intentionally reflect on one's relationship with God in the presence of another who listens with compassion." Although all facets of one's life are fodder for direction, the primary focus is always on discernment of Spirit's presence and work in the directee's life. The question is, "And where do you see God in all of this?" And this can mean a specific event or situation, or the entire trajectory of one's life - past, present, and future.

Prayer is a cornerstone of direction. It is always included as part of a session and as an integral part of the relationship between sessions. Generally, one meets with their director once a month, and the spiritual director covenants to pray for the directee during their time apart. The directee seeks to create a discipline of prayer so as to deepen and broaden his or her own prayer life.

It is understood by both that when they come together in session, there are always three in the room. The Christ-spirit is the third, and both the director and the directee attempt to listen for His voice and be guided by His heart-nudgings. Their desire is to transcend their reliance on their own understandings and seek his wisdom and will instead.

Emergency food is also available inside the big Red Bus.

Inside Crossroads was busy as well, with the Railroad Project and Choice Pantry! The Railroad Project greeted 135 households and provided medical screenings, clothing, free phones with free phone service, and connections to various agencies. The Choice Pantry, staffed by the First Pres Young Adults, provided groceries for 99 families.


