Lent at First Pres

"Lent is a kind of pilgrimage or journey. Such a journey calls for simplifying things and for traveling light. It is a time for each of us to ask, "what helps me live my faith, and what gets in the way?" Lent is a good time to begin or to enrich devotional reading and prayer disciplines. Lent is a good time to serve the poor and work for justice. Lent is a good time for a spiritual retreat that includes silences, prayer, reflection, and worship. Lent is a good time to ask, "Is my identity rooted in faith, baptism, and discipleship, or is it rooted in something else? If it's rooted in something else, what do I need to do about that?" Lent is a time to live into a new way of being, with God's help.

The liturgical season of Lent is a period of preparation for Easter lasting forty days (excluding Sundays) that begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14. During Lent, First Presbyterian offers a variety of worship, study, and reflective opportunities for the Lenten journey. Ash Wednesday: February 14

Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent with a focus on repentance. Marked with the sign of ashes, we begin with a posture of humility as we focus on God's love and forgiveness. First Presbyterian offers three opportunities to worship: 12 noon in the Chapel, 5.30 p.m. at Worship on Wednesdays at Community Crossroads (1516 Hemphill St.), and 7 p.m. in the Sanctuary or livestream at fpcfw.org/livestream.

Midday Prayer Services: Wednesdays, February 21 through March 20 at 12 p.m.

These 30-minute services in the Sanctuary offer reflection on the season with prayer, music, and message.

Lenten Afternoon Concerts: Wednesdays, February 21 through March 20 at 12:30 p.m.

Pastor's Letter



Dear friends, There is a wonderful old story about a disciple who goes to his master teacher for wisdom and guidance. However, instead of listening to his

teacher, the disciple talked and talked and talked about his life, his problems, and his questions. Eventually, the teacher served the disciple a cup of tea. The teacher patiently poured the tea into the cup until it was full, and then kept on pouring. When the disciple had enough of it, he reacted and said. "Can't you see that my cup is full? It's not possible to get anymore in!" "Just so," the teacher responded, stopping at last, "and like this cup, you are filled with your own ideas. How can you expect me to give you wisdom and guidance unless you first empty your cup?"

Later this month on Valentine's Day, the season of Lent begins. I'm wondering, are you leaving any room for Jesus in your cup? Joan Chittister writes that "Lent is a time for trimming the soul and scraping the sludge off a life turned slipshod. Lent is about taking stock of time, even religious time. Lent is about exercising the control that enables us to say no to ourselves so that when life turns hard of its own accord we have the spiritual stamina to say yes to its twists and turns with faith and with hope."

If vou're like me, sometimes vou may have a hard time slowing down and emptying your cup. This means that seasons like Lent can slip by our radars. For a moment, let's take a deep breath and reflect on ways we may engage this season in a new way. Our Lenten theme this year is "Table Talk with Jesus." Together, we'll be thinking about ways we encounter our Lord at the table. In Lenten covenant groups or in personal study, some will be reading the new book "Meeting Jesus at the Table" by Cynthia Campbell and Christine Fohr (stay tuned for more details). Or maybe there is another way you want to connect with Jesus this year, perhaps around a table with friends. There are plenty of ways to begin the journey to the Table, to the Cross, and to Easter, and when life happens, remember: it's never too late to begin the journey.

As we draw closer to this holy season, and in all the seasons of life, may you have the strength and courage to get started, leave some room in your cup for Jesus, and know that there's a place at the table for you. May you trust in the God of Second Chances, and may you know and believe at the deepest corners of your soul that God will never leave you and God will never forsake you.



What Makes You Come Alive? Sundays, March 3-April 4



"Don't ask what the world needs. Ask what makes you come alive and go do that, because what the world needs is more people who have come alive." *-Howard Thurman*

Do you recognize the quote but not the name, Howard Thurman? Would you be surprised that in the early 1950's Time magazine named him one of the ten most significant religious leaders in

America (a list that also included Norman Vincent Peale and Billy Graham)?

Now, are you still wondering why you don't recognize this man?

When the Civil Rights Movement took shape in the United States, Thurman was a nationally recognized human rights advocate, though he did not take to marching and mobilizing in the streets. He preferred to serve as a caretaker and spiritual advisor to those who did, among them Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Jesse Jackson, Marian Wright Edelman, and John Lewis. Dr. King was known to carry his Bible and a copy of Thurman's Jesus and the Disinherited with him at all times.

While in India, a meeting with Mahatma Gandhi convinced Thurman and his wife Sue of the nonviolent path. Then while viewing the Kyber Pass they also became convinced of interracial, interfaith worship. Together they would work to facilitate The Church for the Fellowship of All Peoples, a church that Eleanor Roosevelt supported in its inception.

A mystic, a prophet, a mentor... Howard Thurman was this and more! Please join this six-week class on *Howard Thurman: What Makes You Come Alive?* as it begins on Sunday, March 3 and continues through April 14 during the 10 a.m. church school hour each week.
