# The Power of Touch

In one of my favorite scenes in the gospels, a man with leprosy comes to Jesus and begs him to be healed of his disease. Jesus is moved with pity, touches the man, and he is immediately healed (Mark 1: 40-42). On the surface, this seems like so many other healing miracles of Jesus. But there's actually something more going on.

What makes the story extraordinary is that Jesus could have healed the man without touching him. He healed on other occasions without physically touching people; sometimes even from a distance. That Jesus chose to touch the leper might just be the most important part of this story. Because it reminds us both of Jesus' compassion, and of the importance of human touch.

Touch is the first sense to develop in human beings, and as our other senses fade in later years, touch will likely remain the one sense that can keep us best connected to others. And yet, sadly, many of us fail to grasp the power of touch. But Jesus certainly did. He fully understood that the leper didn't just need to be physically healed, but he also longed for human touch. Lepers were considered "unclean" by society and religion, and never received human contact outside the "colonies" in which they were forced to live. So, Jesus' simple (yet profound) touch of the leper must have brought an emotional healing, along with a sense of connection, belonging and worth.

We must obviously be respectful in the ways we touch one another. But something as simple as a handshake, an appropriate hug, or holding someone's hands as we speak with them can offer tremendous benefits. The right kind of touch can lower blood pressure, heart rate, stress and cortisol levels; and can stimulate the hippocampus, the area of the brain involved in memory, learning and emotion. Appropriate touch can truly be healing ministry.

I am grateful the days of social distancing are behind us. For it's difficult for us to be the body of Christ without being "in touch" with one another. So I hope you will consider how your use of appropriate touch might help to heal and strengthen the lives of others. And I look forward to shaking your hand this Sunday at church.

### 2023 Missions Year in Review

Last month, we shared highlights of Missions at DUMC. This month, we share highlights of the work of DUMC United Women in Faith (UWF). The highlights below has been compiled by Patty Gruce, Lisa Delano, and the DUMC United Women in Faith circles. Thank you to all those connected to UWF and for being the Body of Christ in our community.

### **United Women in Faith Mission**

We seek to connect and nurture women through Christian spiritual formation, leadership development, creative fellowship, and education so that they can inspire, influence, and impact local and global communities.

#### 2023 UWF Ministry Highlights

- Six circles covering all ages met monthly to love, support, and pray; to learn about issues affecting women and children and their needs; and to serve and be in mission with each other and other organizations to meet needs and effect change.
- We gave financial gifts totaling \$5,080 to 12 different local agencies. Yearly fundraising (Sunday Sundries and Snacks, Fall Back Sale, and pimento cheese sales) supports our discretionary giving, which we share within our community to those whose efforts make a difference in the lives of women, children, and youth.
- Individual mission giving to UWF impacted the national UWF's work in our state, our country, and across the world.
- Our 2023 goal of \$2,000 was exceeded with an additional gift to the United Women in Faith Legacy Fund, ensuring that UWF makes a difference for many years to come.
- UWF led two Wednesday morning Bible Studies which were offered to all women in the church in the spring (*The Belonging Project*) and fall (*Devoted, 30 Days with Women of the Bible*).
- UWF continued to serve the families of DUMC with bereavement reception/meals, recognition of births with a rosebud during worship, and outreach to homebound members.
- During the Advent and Christmas seasons, we continued our tradition of displaying a tree with Chrismon symbols in the Sanctuary for the congregation to enjoy and take pictures with, as well as providing an opportunity to learn more about the symbols and their significance.
- Our members generously provided items to help fill Christmas boxes for our Joy Store families including fresh fruit, candy, hot chocolate, protein bars, and candy canes.
- UWF supported Levine Dickson Hospice by donating over 600 individual snacks.
- UWF members participated in UWF Metro District events, such as the Prayer Breakfast, Mission Study, and Annual Celebration as well as the WNCC UWF's Ubuntu Day of Service.
- Our unit of six circles once again earned Mission Today's Gold Unit status by qualifying with 16 out of 27 criteria.
- The UWF Reading Program is supported in the DUMC Library by the purchase of books and the promotion of the program. Members participate at different levels, reading from five different categories: Leadership Development, Nurturing for Community, Education for Mission, Social Action, and Spiritual Growth. Two of our members reached Level II and four reached Level I.



# United Women in Faith

- Our annual United Women in Faith Sunday honored Jenny Brewton, Karen Holmes, Jessica Kearney, and Marsha Payne with a Special Mission Recognition and memorialized our members Judy Feigl, Gerri Sampson, Pat Delk, Ann Hawk, Faye Hayes, Louise Martin, Lois Pippin, Janet Poole, and Dorothy Varner.
- The Carrie Robinson Circle was revitalized with 30 members. Christian Mothers United also began a new chapter. CMU hosted several welcome receptions for DUMC preschool parents.
- First Friday Fellowship began with monthly opportunities for fellowship and service including UMCOR hygiene kits taken to District Mission Study, literacy bags taken to Ada Jenkins LEARNWorks Afterschool Program, our first Walk for Mission, summer lunch bags for Angels and Sparrows, breakfast and lunch provided for LEARNWorks Summer Camp, awareness/outreach through Go Jen Go, 180 containers of pimento cheese made, and assembled Joy Store Christmas boxes.
- All women in UWF have access to our ongoing Prayer List, which is updated and distributed monthly.
- A Bright Lights article on our Carolina Caviar, Pimento Cheese with Heart, was submitted to the Response magazine, and we are anxiously awaiting its publication.
- Cookies with Santa, open to all DUMC families and DUMC Preschool families, was held in the Chapel. We participated in Trunk or Treat at DUMC.
- Updated and refreshed DUMC UWF information on the DUMC website. It is listed as a separate tab under Grow.
- We continue to have a seat on the Missions Committee team and attend monthly meetings as well as have representation as a voting member on the DUMC Administrative Council.
- Six UWF members participated in the Needs of the North tour organized by the Ada Jenkins Center.
- Joy Circle members were integrated into the Mizpah Circle.
- Sharing Circle volunteered monthly at Bags of Hope packing allergy bags.
- CMU and Mizpah Circle joined together to pack Bags of Hope Thanksgiving Break bags.
- Carrie Robinson Circle helped make Christmas merry for 15 families through the Merry Magic Project.
- Founders Circle generously donated snacks to the Ada Jenkins LEARNWorks Afterschool Program.
- Mizpah Circle has been a longtime supporter of All in Guatemala and Brookstone Schools Summer Mission Possible Camp.
- Abundant Life Circle has a great relationship with Bridges of Heart, formerly Bright Blessings, and with Hope House where they have held spring and fall events as well as providing a Thanksgiving meal and gratitude bracelets.
- The DUMC Unit contributed to all five channels of UWF Mission Giving: Gift to Mission, Gift in Memory, Pledge to Mission, Special Mission Recognition, and World Thank Offering.

2024 United Women of Faith Reading Program books are available in the library! The United Women of Faith (UWF) Reading Program books reflect the core values of the UWF: the empowerment of women, youth, and children; anti-racism and multiculturalism; inclusion and equity; fair labor practices; and economic and environmental stewardship and sustainability.



The reading program itself is inclusive; you don't have to be a United Methodist or a woman to participate. It involves reading at least five books a year, one from each of five categories. The purpose of the program is to expand understanding, encourage critical thinking, increase empathy, nurture spiritual growth, and strengthen involvement. With knowledge comes transformation; with transformation comes action.
