Each year we conclude Annual Conference by praying together the prayer commonly known as the Wesley Covenant Prayer. The words of the Covenant Prayer are taken from a book by Richard Alleine, a Puritan minister of the mid-seventeenth century. John Wesley, father of Methodism, was fond of Alleine's work and first used the prayer in a Covenant Service in London in August 1755. Wesley would hold regular Covenant Services with the early Methodists throughout his life. The prayer, in its present form, is the creation of twentieth-century British Methodists and came to American Methodism in the 1960's...

The theme of the prayer is self-abandonment or surrender to God and its words move us to consider anew the question that is at the heart of the spiritual life, "Can we trust God with our lives?"[1] That is, can we truly respond in unwavering obedience to Christ's call to leave behind our old self and follow Christ, in newness of life, wherever he might lead?

As we enter into a New Year, I invite you to spend a few moments each day reading and praying over the Covenant Prayer. Join me in reflecting upon how God is inviting us not only to speak the words of this beautiful prayer with our lips but to embody it in our lives. Perhaps in place of, or alongside our usual New Year's resolutions, consider what it might mean for us as individuals and as a Church to be resolved to belonging to God, and truly allowing God to use us however God desires.

2023 Missions Year in Review

As we reflect on last year, Amanda Chaney, Chair of the Davidson UMC Missions Committee, shares some of the ways we were the Body of Christ in our community and around the world in 2023:

"We have had an unbelievable 2023 in Missions at Davidson UMC, and I am so blessed to chair the committee responsible for Missions. This year, we have impacted the lives of so many in our community. I am so proud to be a part of such a generous and loving church.

Here are just a few of the many things we've been able to accomplish through your generous gifts:

- Many families have received much-needed assistance with housing and utility bills through our partnership and support of the Ada Jenkins Critical Assistance Fund.
- Church members traveled to Kenya to visit the children we've helped through our mission partner, ZOE Empowers, and another trip is planned for September 2024.
- We dedicated yet another Habitat House earlier this year and helped to provide a home for a family in our Mooresville community.
- A group went on a Disaster Response trip for flood relief in the mountains of Western NC (Haywood County), and several church members completed the UMCOR Early Response Team Training.
- Mission Partner, All In Guatemala, continues to thrive and help our brothers and sisters in Chichicastenego, Guatemala with medical and educational needs. They have another trip planned early this year.
- We hosted our annual Mission Mall, and it was a huge success. Many of our partners received double the amount of donations from the previous year.
- The Davidson Community Garden received new raised beds which will help them to feed more people in our community.
- The Joy Store provided gifts for 46 families and 110 children, which
 was estimated to be over \$14,000 in gifts. Additionally, out of the
 abundance of Joy Store gifts, we were able to provide additional
 gifts for children at The Christian Mission in Mooresville.
- Our Harvest Procession provided nearly 400 bags of food for families in our community for Thanksgiving.











Exploring the Path to Abiding in God's Presence

Seven years ago, Don Carroll offered a one-day Enneagram retreat for the staff at the church I was then serving, Mount Tabor United Methodist Church. I could see that the Enneagram was an important tool for spiritual growth that offered many layers of meaning. The popular appeal of the Enneagram is that it helps people to understand their personalities. However, Don emphasized a greater purpose: it can teach us how to live out of the image and likeness of God. I knew then that I wanted to bring Don in one day to offer a more substantial study series. My intention became a reality this Fall as Davidson UMC launched a 10-week exploration of the Enneagram.



Right away, I could see that this would be a popular offering, as the interest for the course extended from our church into the community. Our group was a rich and varied one, including twenty-seven participants. They were members of Davidson UMC, Inclusion Community, Wesleyan Contemplative Order, and the Lake Norman community. Each week, we began with a centering experience to help us transition into this deeper conversation. Don then gave us a detailed description of one particular Enneagram type. Sometimes, we would even have a testimony from someone who identified with that type.

Our focus was on discovering the divine gifts each type offers and the way that the ego can block those gifts. Each week, we also engaged in a partnered inquiry, where we experienced each type from all three centers—body, mind, and heart. We would discuss the experience and ask questions that came up for us. Most of our questions focused on how we can move beyond the needs of our ego to operate from a place of divine love. At the end of our series, we took up a love offering for Don that totaled over \$1,000.00. I thought this spoke well of this experience's value for participants.

We invited participants to provide personal testimonies. Hear what Deanna Wilson had to share about her experience:

"First, thank you, Davidson UMC and Dianne, for recognizing the importance of this course, and a huge thank you to Don Carroll for teaching and guiding us! The material and Don's compassionate nature have been such a gift to me. This ancient wisdom of understanding the nature of God, discovering His attributes within ourselves, and learning how to best live in the image and likeness of God has been heart- and thought-provoking. I look forward to learning more about the enneagram and how my type influences how I perceive and respond to situations and how I see the world. This study has also given me a greater appreciation for how we are all unique and yet all the same and how God's love shines through each of us in unique and beautiful ways when we are in touch with our true self."

A Gift of Generosity

This past fall, we were given an opportunity to purchase a piano for our Sanctuary. In recent years, Davidson UMC has attracted artists to perform, and this new piano is certainly attractive to artists who are considering Davidson UMC as a stop on their performance tours. Our new piano is 9'2", which is considerably larger than our previous Sanctuary piano. It weighs about 1,700 pounds (as much as a 1993 Honda Civic), and it was built in 1928 in Boston, Massachusetts, by the Mason and Hamlin piano company. Henry Mason was the son of church musician/hymn writer Lowell Mason (*Blest Be the Tie that Binds*, and he also arranged the tune to *Joy to the World*). Mason and Hamlin pianos are made by hand and are among the highest quality. Our piano was made using wood that comes from trees probably planted before the War of 1812. A New York City concert pianist owned it for a while before most recently being in Illinois.

Our efforts to acquire this piano involved trading two of our four baby grand pianos for credit. After securing the blessings from the Trustees Committee and the Finance Committee, we agreed on a price with the seller. At that time, Beckie and Mark McCall came to speak with me about giving a gift to honor Beckie's mother. They agreed to help sponsor the purchase of this piano. Like the piano, Betty Carter was born in 1928. Married to a preacher, Betty provided music for countless church services and events over her husband's career. Beckie wanted to honor a gift her parents gave her many years ago by providing a down payment for her first house. Betty and her husband, Syl, were generous so many years ago. That gift, in turn, inspired Beckie to be generous. Many of us at Davidson UMC and in our community can hear ripples of their generosity in our new piano.
