Daniel: Living Faithfully in Exile

Daniel 1:8 - "But Daniel resolved not to defile himself with the royal food and wine, and he asked the chief official for permission not to defile himself this way."

- Theological Significance: This verse demonstrates the importance of personal conviction and resolve in maintaining spiritual integrity.
- Application: We should identify areas where we might be tempted to compromise our faith and make intentional decisions to remain faithful.

3. Subversive Faithfulness:

Pastor Keith introduced the concept of "subversion" as a way of living faithfully within a challenging culture.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. How did Daniel practice "subversive faithfulness" in Babylon?
- 2. In what ways can we be "subversively faithful" in our workplaces, schools, or communities?

Supporting Verses:

Daniel 1:11-12 - "Daniel then said to the guard whom the chief official had appointed over Daniel, Hananiah, Mishael and Azariah, 'Please test your servants for ten days: Give us nothing but vegetables to eat and water to drink."

Context and Reflection:

- Historical/Cultural Context: Daniel found a creative way to maintain his religious convictions while still respecting authority.
- Theological Significance: This passage shows how believers can navigate challenging situations with wisdom and integrity.
- Application: We should seek creative ways to live out our faith that don't unnecessarily antagonize others but still maintain our spiritual integrity.

Conclusion:

Pastor Keith Jenkins' message reminded us that as "citizens of heaven," we are called to live faithfully in a world that often opposes our values. Like Daniel, we can maintain our spiritual identity, resist unhealthy cultural assimilation, and practice subversive faithfulness in our daily lives.

- 1. What specific cultural pressures do you face that challenge your Christian identity?
- 2. How can you develop greater resolve, like Daniel, to maintain your spiritual integrity?
- 3. In what areas of your life can you practice "subversive faithfulness" this week?
