Context and Reflection:

- Historical/Cultural Context: These passages reflect God's consistent call for His people to pursue justice and care for the vulnerable.
- Theological Significance: They emphasize that true faith is expressed through active engagement in social justice.
- Application: We should actively seek ways to promote justice and speak truth in our spheres of influence.

Conclusion:

Pastor Keith Jenkins' message reminded us that as the Church, we are called to be a prophetic witness in the world. This involves living out our distinct identity as those called by God, proclaiming His vision for humanity, and actively pursuing justice and truth in society.
