Context and Reflection:

- Historical/Cultural Context: John was establishing Jesus' divine nature against early heresies.
- Theological Significance: These verses affirm Jesus' full deity and humanity.
- Application: We should embrace the full biblical understanding of Jesus' identity.
- 3. Two Responses to Jesus:

Pastor Keith contrasted the responses of the Rich Young Ruler and Zacchaeus to Jesus.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. What similarities and differences do you see in these two encounters with Jesus?
- 2. Which response more closely reflects your own relationship with Jesus?

Supporting Verses:

Luke 19:8-10 - "Zacchaeus stood up and said to the Lord, 'Look, Lord! Here and now I give half of my possessions to the poor... Jesus said to him, 'Today salvation has come to this house.'"

Context and Reflection:

- Historical/Cultural Context: These encounters showed different responses to Jesus' call for discipleship.
- Theological Significance: True encounters with Jesus lead to transformation and surrender.
- Application: We should examine our own response to Jesus' call on our lives.

Conclusion:

Pastor Keith Jenkins' message reminded us that our understanding of and response to Jesus' identity shapes everything about our faith and lives. We must move beyond cultural opinions and traditions to have a personal encounter with Jesus as Lord and Savior.

Reflection Questions:

- 1. How would you personally answer Jesus' question, "Who do you say that I am?"
- 2. What areas of your life need to come into alignment with your profession of Jesus as Lord?
- 3. How can you help others understand Jesus' true identity during this Christmas season?
