Context and Reflection:

- Historical/Cultural Context: People expected a powerful military and political leader.
- Theological Significance: God's power is often displayed through apparent weakness.
- Application: We should reconsider how we measure true greatness.

3. A Different Kind of Kingdom:

Pastor Keith emphasized how Jesus established a spiritual rather than political kingdom.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. How does Jesus' definition of kingdom differ from worldly kingdoms?
- 2. What challenges do you face in living by kingdom values rather than worldly values?

Supporting Verses:

John 18:36 - "My Kingdom is not an earthly kingdom. If it were, my followers would fight to keep me from being handed over to the Jewish leaders. But my Kingdom is not of this world."

Context and Reflection:

- Historical/Cultural Context: People longed for political liberation from Rome.
- Theological Significance: Jesus came to establish an eternal, spiritual kingdom.
- Application: We should seek transformation from within rather than external power.

Conclusion:

Pastor Keith Jenkins' message reminded us that God's ways often defy our expectations, but His sovereign plan surpasses anything we could imagine. While Jesus wasn't the king people expected, He was and is exactly the king humanity needs.

Reflection Questions:

- 1. What expectations of God might you need to surrender?
- 2. How can you better align your life with Jesus' model of servant leadership?
- 3. In what ways has God worked in your life that were different than you expected but proved to be better?

Heavenly Father, thank you for your sovereign wisdom that often works differently than we expect. Help us to trust your ways even when they don't match our expectations.
