- Application: We should respond to God's revelation with immediate and enthusiastic action.

3. Living on Mission:

Discussion Questions:

1. What does living "on mission" look like in your daily life?

2. How can we effectively share the good news in our current cultural context?

Supporting Verses:

Luke 2:17-20 - "After seeing him, the shepherds told everyone what had happened and what the angel had said to them about this child. All who heard the shepherds' story were astonished, but Mary kept all these things in her heart and thought about them often. The shepherds went back to their flocks, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen."

Context and Reflection:

- Historical/Cultural Context: The shepherds became the first evangelists of the gospel.
- Theological Significance: Encountering Jesus naturally leads to sharing the good news with others.
- Application: We are called to share our experience of Jesus' good news through both words and actions.
