East Hill Church Sermon Discussion Guide:

Prayer: A Transformative Privilege

Speaker: Pastor Keith Jenkins

Date: February 9, 2025

Introduction:

In this powerful follow-up to last week's message, Pastor Keith Jenkins explored prayer as a profound privilege rather than merely a practice. Building on the previous week's insights about partnering with God, he emphasized our direct access to the Father, the conversational nature of prayer, and our privilege of intercession for others.

1. Direct Access to the Father:

Pastor Keith emphasized how Jesus has given us unprecedented access to God through His sacrifice.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. How does understanding prayer as a privilege rather than an obligation change your approach to it?
- 2. What barriers keep you from fully embracing your access to God?
- 3. How can you cultivate a greater awareness of God's availability to you?

Supporting Verses:

Matthew 27:50-51 - "Then Jesus shouted out again, and he released his spirit. At that moment the curtain in the sanctuary of the Temple was torn in two, from top to bottom."

Hebrews 4:14-16 - "Therefore, since we have a great high priest who has ascended into heaven, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold firmly to the faith we profess. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to empathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are—yet he did not sin. Let us then approach God's

throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need."

Context and Reflection:

- Historical/Cultural Context: The temple veil represented separation between God and humanity.
- Theological Significance: Jesus' death provided direct access to God's presence.
- Application: We can approach God confidently, knowing He welcomes us.

2. Prayer as Conversation:

Pastor Keith highlighted how prayer should be a dialogue with God rather than merely a list of requests.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. How can you move from transactional to relational prayer?
- 2. What practices help you listen to God in prayer?
- 3. How has God spoken to you through prayer recently?

Supporting Verses:

Matthew 6:5-9 - "When you pray, don't be like the hypocrites who love to pray publicly on street corners and in the synagogues where everyone can see them. I tell you the truth, that is all the reward they will ever get. But when you pray, go away by yourself, shut the door behind you, and pray to your Father in private. Then your Father, who sees everything, will reward you."

Context and Reflection:

• Historical/Cultural Context: Jesus was correcting misunderstandings about prayer's purpose.

- Theological Significance: Prayer is about relationship, not performance.
- Application: We should approach prayer as intimate conversation with our Father.

3. The Privilege of Intercession:

Pastor Keith explained our responsibility and privilege to stand in the gap for others through prayer.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. How has someone else's intercession impacted your life?
- 2. For whom is God calling you to stand in the gap?
- 3. What prevents you from interceding more boldly for others?

Supporting Verses:

1 Timothy 2:1-2 - "I urge you, first of all, to pray for all people. Ask God to help them; intercede on their behalf, and give thanks for them. Pray this way for kings and all who are in authority so that we can live peaceful and quiet lives marked by godliness and dignity."

Ezekiel 22:30 - "I searched for someone to stand in the gap in the wall so I wouldn't have to destroy the land, but I found no one."

Context and Reflection:

- Historical/Cultural Context: Intercessory prayer was a vital part of Old and New Testament faith.
- Theological Significance: God invites us to participate in His work through intercession.
- Application: We should actively pray for others' needs and transformation.

Conclusion:

Pastor Keith Jenkins' message reminded us that prayer is not merely a religious duty but a transformative privilege that allows us to partner with God in His work. Through direct access, intimate conversation, and powerful intercession, we can experience and extend God's presence and power.

Reflection Questions:

- 1. How can you better steward your privilege of access to God?
- 2. What steps can you take to deepen your prayer conversation with God?
- 3. Who needs your intercessory prayer this week?
- 4. How can you make prayer more central to your daily life?
