The Big Idea

Jesus and the gospel He brings is celebrated...until Jesus angers religious insiders because this Good News will include religious outsiders!

Good to Know

- And we're off! This passage marks the official launch of Jesus' Messianic ministry. You might call Luke 4:14-9:20 Jesus' "period of popularity."
- According to Luke, Jesus kicked off His speaking and healing tour in the local synagogue of Nazareth, the little town where He grew up.
- Did you know that Luke's description of this synagogue service is the oldest written account of its kind in ancient literature?
- Synagogues seem to have originated during the exile when Israelites were no longer able to go to the temple. Centuries later, nearly every Jewish community had a synagogue. In many ways, these synagogues resembled small country churches, led by synagogue rulers who recruited people to lead weekly prayers, songs and short sermons from the Hebrew Bible.
- Jesus was a rising star among the rabbis in Judea, so it makes sense that His former synagogue ruler invited Him to be a guest speaker.
- It's likely that most of the village, who had watched Jesus grow up, turned up to hear His first sermon.
- It's fascinating that for His first sermon, Jesus chose Isaiah 61:1-2, inserting an additional line from Isaiah 58:6. This passage was a powerful declaration of gospel hope for Israelites exiled in Babylon—once again, God was calling His people to share in His blessing!
- At first, everyone is amazed at how their "hometown boy" speaks with such "gracious words," but the mood shifts when Jesus suddenly highlights God's special care for ethnic outsiders.
- In just one sermon, Jesus amazes, confuses and then enrages His audience! What a first sermon!
- Jesus' mention of God's favor to the widow and Naaman foreshadows the explosion of the church among non-Jewish people in Acts.
- His mention of being rejected in His hometown foreshadows His betrayal and crucifixion at the hands of His own people.

Conversation Starters

1. If you had to talk in front of people about something for 10 minutes without any preparation, what might you talk about?
2. What does Jesus' reading from Isaiah 61 (vv. 18-19) reveal about His mission? How does this fulfill God's promises?
3. Why is it significant that Jesus declared, "Today this Scripture is fulfilled in your hearing" (v. 21)? How would that have sounded to His original audience?
4. The crowd was amazed at Jesus at first, but their mood changed when He spoke about God's mercy toward outsiders (vv. 25-27). Why do you think that upset them so much?
5. What do Elijah and Elisha's stories (which Jesus referenced) reveal about God's pattern of extending grace beyond Israel? How does this challenge any assumptions we might have about who "deserves" God's blessing?
6. Who might be today's "outsiders" that we struggle to believe God is moving toward with His blessing?
7. Are there aspects of Jesus' teaching that make you uncomfortable? Where do you feel tempted to embrace some parts of the gospel while rejecting others?
8. How can we make sure our faith isn't shaped more by personal preferences or cultural biases than by Jesus' mission?
