ADVENT DEVOTIONAL

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DAY 1

The Promise of a Messiah

Genesis 3:15

In the business world there is a phrase that states, “hope isn’t a strategy.” It’s meant to remind us that hope can’t replace planning, effort and execution. However, in the story of Scripture, hope is the strategy. This isn’t the kind of sentimental hope you have when you wish for something to happen before you blow out the candles on your birthday cake. It’s entirely different. Biblical hope is the confident expectation that God is who He says He is and will do what He says He will do. In other words, our hope is in the promises of God.

Genesis 3:15 is called by scholars the Protoevangelium - which means “the first gospel.” In the middle of Adam and Eve’s darkest moment, God spoke of His future redemption. He whispered His divine intention to send a Savior in the future who will make the world and everything in it whole. As one of my favorite authors NT Wright puts it, “He will bring the world to rights.” Adam and Eve’s sin set a trajectory of brokenness in the world and distance between man and God. And in the the middle of this darkest hour, God whispers of a future hope.

It’s interesting to me that the Hebrew word for hope, “tikvah,” literally means a cord or tether. Hope keeps us tethered to God, His plans, and His purposes. Ultimately, when we have a biblical hope we are attaching ourselves to the promise of Jesus. The promise of his first advent as a baby born in Bethlehem, and the promise of the second advent as the King of Heaven to renew all things in the future. In this way, hope isn’t just “a” strategy, it is “the” strategy.

As we enter this Advent season, let’s together keep our hope focused on the person of Jesus Christ.

DAY 2

ISAIAH'S PROPHECY

Isaiah 9:6-7

There's something almost scandalous about Isaiah's prophecy. "A child is born to us, a son is given to us"—notice the careful distinction. The first speaks of a genuine human birth, the arrival of a new human life. The second suggests something—or someone—who already existed, now being presented as a gift. It's as if Isaiah is saying, "Pay attention, something mysterious is happening here."

We live in a world obsessed with power—military might, political influence, and economic leverage. Yet, God's solution to humanity's darkness arrives wrapped in swaddling clothes. The Most High God becomes a dependent infant. The Prince of Peace enters through a human womb. It's the kind of plot twist that no ancient Near Eastern prophet would dare invent, yet here it is, cryptically spoken of centuries before Bethlehem.

This ancient hope is different from wishful thinking. Isaiah speaks of the future with language of certainty, as though it is already accomplished fact—"his name will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God." In God's eyes, the future is already secure. This is not optimism; it's anchored reality because His plan cannot be thwarted.

Also, consider the scope of this peace that He will bring—it ranges from international global conflicts down to the civil war raging in individual's hearts. The child born in Bethlehem doesn't just negotiate treaties between nations; He also reconciles the divided self, the anxious mind, and the restless soul. He brings peace to marriages, to neighborhoods, even to the secret places where we're at war within ourselves.

C. S. Lewis reminds us that the Son of God became human so that humans might become sons and daughters of God. This is the great exchange—His throne for our manger, his glory for our shame, His peace for our anxiety, His death for our lives. The child born is the son given, and in receiving Him, we receive everything.

Isaiah looked ahead to both Christmas and the Second Coming—to the baby and the King. We live between them, in the "already but not yet," tasting now what will be fully realized then. This is where our hope lives: not in the denial of darkness, but in the certainty that light has come and will come again.

"The true light, which gives light to everyone, was coming into the world." (John 1:9).

DAY 3

THE ROOT OF JESSE

Isaiah 11:1-10

When I read this future presented by Isaiah, it's almost too beautiful for me to begin comprehending. A King who has the Spirit of the Lord covering him so obviously? A King who delights in obeying the Lord? His character is so obvious that it clothes him—a belt of righteousness and a belt of faithfulness. It's so good that the predator and prey live together, the child is safe near the cobras. The nations look to him—God recovers the remnants that have been lost.

The promise from God here is too good for my little brain. I want to see it, to know it. I'm impatient for it. The Jewish people who received this prophecy were waiting in what felt like a completely barren landscape. I imagine how impossible these promises would have felt to them. How desperate they were to see them. Me too, me too! I am just like them. I tend to place my hope in things I can see, things I can predict, things that feel much more immediate. This is a long-haul promise—it's one the first hearers waited on, and it's one that we wait for the fullness of.

This Advent, I want to look at these words and feel hope—the goodness of God's Kingdom is coming. I want to cling to this vision of the future. I want to place my hope in this—not in anything else. My hope can sit here, as impatient as it is: Jesus's Kingdom is in motion, and the fullness of it is on its way.

DAY 5

The Voice in the Wilderness

Isaiah 40:1-5

Our passage today is a prophecy out of Isaiah. The second half of our verses are most famous for being quoted by John the Baptist right before Jesus began his ministry. In that story, John lays claim to these verses as his life's work as, "A voice crying in the wilderness, prepare the way of the Lord."

The big themes of this prophecy are comfort and hope. I love the tone of verses 1-2. To me they show a God who leans down and reaches out a hand to let His people know that everything is going to be okay. We see His assurances that He will end what is plaguing Israel, and that He'll forgive and pay for their sins completely.

In verse 3, the tone of the passage shifts. Instead of comfort and promises from God, we hear about, "a voice in the wilderness" which is calling God's people to, "make straight" the way of the Lord. The people who originally heard the words of Isaiah wouldn't know that these same words were used to foretell the coming of the Messiah, Jesus, in the very first season of Advent.

It can seem like a complete change in theme to go from words of comfort straight to a call for action, but when we look a little deeper we see that God's comfort, even all the way back in Isaiah, is made possible by Jesus coming down and being born into our world. When He comes back again, our comfort will be complete. "And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken."

Jesus' presence makes all comfort possible. The hope of His coming is the source of ALL hope for us. And it comes with a calling from a lonely voice in the wilderness. "Prepare the way of the Lord."

DAY 6

The Virgin Birth Foretold

Isaiah 7:14

Isaiah makes this prophecy about Jesus being born to Mary around 700 years before it occurred. The prophecy was made to Ahaz, King of Judah during a difficult time when the Davidic line (the line God promised the Messiah Jesus would come from) was under threat from Rezin the King of Aram and Pekah the King of the northern ten tribes of Israel. These two kings were headed toward Ahaz with the intent of overthrowing the king and placing someone else on the throne.

Isaiah was sent by God to invite King Ahaz to request any “sign” (miracle) he wished with the result that Rezin and Pekah would not have their way. God was asking Ahaz to trust in Him and not in Ahaz’s own power to solve the situation. Ahaz refused to ask for a sign saying that it would be wrong to test God. Isaiah explained, however, that this was not a test but an invitation from God (1 John 5:14-15). Ahaz again refused, instead deciding to trust in himself and tried to bribe his way into safety with the King of Assyria.

This is when Isaiah makes the prophecy about a virgin giving birth, and He will be called Immanuel. For Ahaz, this prophecy had the immediate fulfillment in his son Hezekiah being born which would continue the line of David that would lead to Jesus, but it also points to the birth of Jesus. The one true King. Jesus, the one whose kingdom will last forever.

Now, I do not know what would have happened if Ahaz would have agreed and asked God for a miracle, but I can safely guess that things would have gone differently. Ahaz chose to rely on himself instead of God and that did not work out well for him. In our own life it is easy to rely on ourselves instead of God. We think to ourselves, “I’ve got this,” but God is faithful. Even when we try to work in our own strength, He does not leave us on our own. God keeps His promises and through Jesus has fulfilled His promises, like the one given by Isaiah of being with us and never leaving us, even to the end of the age (Matthew 28:20).

DAY 7

Preparing Our Hearts

Malachi 3:1-4

What if the very trial you're asking God to remove is the very answer to a prayer you prayed long ago to be made more like Him?

Are you familiar with the process of a refiner's fire? A refiner's fire melts down a metal, such as gold or silver, for purification purposes. Once a metal is in its liquid state, the dross in the metal rises to the top and is then removed from the metal before it cools. A refiner's fire does not destroy the metal, rather it allows the impurities within to come up so that it can be removed. A refiner's fire does not consume; it makes the metal better and more valuable.

We see here in Malachi that a refiner's fire is a powerful picture of when God's people encounter His transformative power. Refinement isn't about punishment, rather it's about transformation. God knows our sins, and He knows our needs. We are not left to save ourselves. He meets us where we're at and cares deeply about the condition of our hearts.

We are precious to Him.

When we embrace the trials in our lives and turn our hearts to Him, He will make us pure, righteous, and spare us the pain of separation from Him.

May this give you hope and courage to face any hardship that comes because God will strengthen your faith and purify your heart.

DAY 8

The Angel Appears to Zechariah



Luke 1:5-25

Zechariah and Elizabeth are two characters from the Advent narrative who found themselves in what I call a long-haul wait. In Luke 1, we witness them receiving the long-awaited gift and miracle they thought had been taken off the table for them. They were well past the window of when having a child was physically 'normal.' They likely carried the identity of barren and scorned. It was no small thing at this time to be childless. But we know they were faithful. Scripture describes them as, "righteous in the sight of God" (Luke 1:6).

We can imagine what they might have been thinking or feeling in these iconic moments in Scripture, when they respond to this miraculous news. But we have to fill in the lines of the years before and after. There is so much to the story that built up to this moment. I can't help but wonder how they remained righteous and observant in the face of their disappointment. Then there is the classic proverb, "Hope deferred makes the heart sick..." (Proverbs 13:12). I call it classic because I have found it to be so true in my own life and story. Heart sick from long-haul waiting.

Zechariah and Elizabeth were forced to be patient. In our culture, we are terrible at patience! Mostly because we rarely have to be patient. We live in a world where everything comes quickly and on demand. We get accustomed to what we want, how we want it, when we want it. But we also don't have control. There are moments we are thrust into this truth. Whether we are waiting for relationships to be reconciled, test results, a house to sell, a loved one to go be with Jesus, a baby to join a family. We do not have control of so much. And that can cause incredible discomfort, impatience, frustration and disappointment.

Often those feelings get directed to God. We might callous or harden ourselves from encountering God in an honest place. We might get mad at what seems like God's lack of care or response- frustrated and broken-hearted. Or we might give up on Him and go into overdrive to try to "make-it-happen" through our own abilities.

DAY 9

The Annunciation to Mary



Luke 1:26-38

Mary—a beautiful force in the Advent story—embodies quiet strength and unwavering faith. Her journey began with a divine interruption from the angel Gabriel who appeared to Mary, not in a moment of grandeur or ceremony— but in the quiet of her ordinary life. He delivered to her the news that she would conceive the Son of God (Luke 1:30-31).

Mary had a plan. She was young, a virgin, and engaged to Joseph. She had her life mapped out, upholding her righteous values. Yet, God showed up and changed the plan with the unimaginable. This would change the course of her life forever. And her response?

“I am the Lord's servant. May your word to me be fulfilled” (Luke 1:38).

Two aspects of Mary's posture in this moment continue to inspire me: her obedience and her surrender.

She was obedient because she trusted God's omniscience.

She surrendered because she believed in His sovereignty.

Even in her questioning, Mary anchored herself in the truth of who God is—mighty, faithful, and a keeper of promises. She didn't just accept the miraculous conception; she embraced it with peace that surpassed understanding. Her “yes” became an integral part of God's redemptive plan.

We know Mary didn't lack fear or uncertainty. But she held the key to true peace: intimacy with the Prince of Peace.

I long for a heart that responds like Mary's.

In our own lives, we face divine interruptions—moments when God's direction feels unexpected or impossible. Like Mary, we may feel troubled or afraid. But peace doesn't come from knowing every detail. It comes from knowing the One who does.

DAY 10

Mary's Visit to Elizabeth

Luke 1:39-45

On the heels of hearing, “Nothing is impossible with God” from Gabriel, Mary in haste travels to her cousin Elizabeth’s home. Both women are living in moments of awe—living the impossible. Elizabeth is pregnant with a promised son and Mary is too. One will be a prophetic messenger, preparing people for the other who will be their promised messianic king.

What makes this passage special is that these women get to share together in the beauty and awe of God’s promises. When Mary arrived, Scripture says: “And when Elizabeth heard the greeting of Mary, the baby leaped in her womb. And Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit, and she exclaimed with a loud cry, ‘Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb!’” But Elizabeth continues: “And blessed is she who believed that there would be a fulfillment of what was spoken to her from the Lord.”

In this blessing, we glimpse a profound source of peace: the peace that comes from believing God’s promises, even when circumstances seem impossible. Elizabeth names what sustains Mary—her faith, her trust that God will do what He said.

Sit with me for a moment in this scene.

There are no phones, no emails, no social media pregnancy announcements. Just a greeting, a leap for joy inside Elizabeth, and the faith of Mary who believed and obeyed. Two women, two miracles, two babies. The world would never be the same.

I love that God gave these women time together. Here God is knitting together the fulfillment of His promise made long ago. These awe moments—when we recognize God at work—aren’t reserved for biblical figures alone. The same God who orchestrated their meeting is still present, still working in our lives today.

Celebrating and praising the Lord in awe moments with others is faith building. This is the same posture Paul encourages (Philippians 4:4, 4:8): “Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, rejoice... Whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things.”

DAY 11

The Magnificat

Luke 1:45-56

Mary's life changed in an instant. A young woman from Nazareth was told by an angel that she would carry God's Son. It was miraculous, yes, but also, I imagine, incredibly overwhelming. How could she, a simple girl, bear the Savior of the world? How would her family respond? How could she trust God with something so seemingly impossible?

As the story unfolds, we see that Mary didn't remain in fear. She responded with a song, the Magnificat, filled with praise, trust, and hope. She magnified the Lord, not because her circumstances were peaceful or easy, but because she recognized God's faithfulness and character. This is a beautiful picture of biblical peace. Even in uncertainty, she displayed deep confidence in God.

Too often, we mistake peace for the absence of difficulty. But true biblical peace is far deeper. It is an inner steadiness rooted in a clear understanding of God's character and unwavering trust in His promises, independent of what is happening around us. This kind of peace quiets fear and restlessness, opening our hearts to love, joy, and hope.

Like Mary, when we are grounded in God's peace, we can face uncertainty with trust, gratitude, and even awe at His goodness. This is the peace Advent points us toward: not a fleeting calm, but a transformative, life-giving peace that flows from God Himself. We, too, are invited to trust and rest in His faithfulness, to find wholeness in His presence, and to rejoice in the ways He is at work, even when it feels uncertain, and we cannot yet see the full picture.

The Birth of John the Baptist



Luke 1:57-80

The circumstances regarding the birth of John the Baptist caused quite a stir among the neighbors and relatives of Zechariah and Elizabeth. A long time coming, the angelic visits, and the silencing of the priest all came together to arouse much anticipation about the arrival of this child. With the prominence of Zechariah's role in the temple, the people would have understandably assumed that the baby would be named in accordance with tradition and probably attain a similar position. When his name was declared and the tongue of Zechariah was set free, the entire area was abuzz with great speculation. "What then will this child become?"

Zechariah proclaimed that John would go before the Lord to prepare the way. Then the Bible simply says that the child grew up and was in the wilderness until the day of his appearance to Israel.

Did the people have any idea that this would take three decades to come to fruition? Did the rejoicing that once surrounded Elizabeth die out in the following years? Were they expecting the Messiah to come soon?

We don't know the answers to those questions, but we do know that they were a bit confused about what had taken place. God's ways are often undiscernible. As humans, we have our own expectations. Yet in Isaiah 55, it says, "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, and your ways are not my ways, declares the Lord".

Throughout Scripture and in our own lives, God sets forth His plans not understood by us, using the often unexpected, and His timing is known only to Him. Nothing happens by chance. God in His infinite wisdom is weaving all things together to accomplish His divine purpose. The challenge can be to simply trust Him when there is no clear understanding of what is taking place and to be at peace knowing that He is in control.

DAY 13

Joseph's Dream

Dark Night Wakes | Glory Breaks

Matthew 1:18-25

One of my family's favorite Christmas songs is "O Little Town of Bethlehem." We find ourselves moved by the melody of this hymn, even more so by its lyrics. The first verse goes like this:

"O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie;
Above thy deep and dreamless sleep, the silent stars go by."

This song draws our imagination to a dark night of waiting, which is also where we find Joseph (the earthly father of Jesus) in Matthew 1. Are you familiar with the story? Joseph is engaged to Mary. Great news, right? Unfortunately, Mary is found to be pregnant before the wedding, which is not great news. Joseph is crushed, and to avoid her shame, he plans to quietly divorce her.

Imagine the weight of this scenario: the sorrow and grief, the racing thoughts, the uncertainty. What a seemingly dark moment in the midst of what should have been such a joyous time for Joseph and Mary.

Can you relate? Have you ever found yourself in the midst of great expectation only to be shocked and surprised by the unthinkable? Who can you trust?

Maybe you find yourself there now in this Advent season. Allow me to encourage you. God is present with you in this moment, and He is not just present--He is working. And you can trust Him.

You see, God was working in this debacle with Joseph and Mary. Verse 20 tells us an angel visits Joseph in a dream, and that the child Mary is bearing is the very Son of God!

The prophesied Messiah whom Isaiah 7 refers to as 'Immanuel,' which literally translates to 'God with us.' What great news for Joseph and Mary (and for us!) Psalm 56:3 says, "When I'm afraid, I put my trust in You."

Joseph trusted God in the midst of what I imagine was a dark, fearful time, and I believe we are invited to do the same. Are you in the midst of a dark, fearful night?

I encourage you to trust in Jesus. Immanuel. God with us. Because He's present, and He's working.

I offer the two final lines from a forgotten stanza of "O Little Town of Bethlehem," followed by a prayer prompt

"Where charity stands watching
and faith holds wide the door;
The dark night wakes, the glory breaks,
and Christmas comes once more."

Luke 2:1-5

Every detail covered, right down to packing the best travel snacks (Cheez-Its and M&M's are my personal favorite).

Some journeys we prepare for with excitement and anticipation, and then some of our journeys happen to us, brought on by circumstances that we didn't plan and cannot control. They may include a diagnosis, a change in our job, or a severed relationship. These journeys include doing things we never thought would be part of our story.

As I think of Joseph and Mary finding out that they had to go to Bethlehem at the most inconvenient time possible, baby due any day, wanting to be near family when the time came for the baby to be born. It makes them very real to me. A decree went out that they had to obey.

We have a choice in how we respond to the “journeys” that we didn't plan. We can ignore them and hope that they go away, or we can ask God, “How would you have me respond right now?”

This past year a family member has faced a challenging medical diagnosis that required me to be present in ways that I didn't plan on. It required me to put many appointments on the calendar and rearrange my schedule.

I will admit that some of it was scary, and I didn't always see how God was going to provide. In those moments God reminded me that I didn't need to see the whole picture, just the next step. As we come to the end of the year, the medical challenge remains, appointments that require my presence are still on my calendar, but the peace that God has given me with every step this past year has been a gift and I have learned to trust Him with what I cannot control.

So, he and his young, very pregnant, wife Mary began the long, difficult journey from Nazareth—a four-day trek on foot. When they finally arrived, the town was overflowing with travelers. Every room was taken. And right then, Mary’s time came.

I doubt they were happy about the situation. Yet, I believe Mary still carried joy in her heart. Earlier, in Luke 1:30-33, an angel had told her, “Do not be afraid... you will give birth to a son, and you will call him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High... His kingdom will never end.” Mary knew she was part of something divine—God’s promise fulfilled.

Happiness depends on our circumstances; it comes and goes with the ups and downs of life. But joy—true joy—comes from the Lord. Through my own walk with Jesus, I’ve faced struggles, troubles, and challenges that were far from happy. Yet, in those moments, my faith sustained me. As Nehemiah 8:10 reminds us, “The joy of the Lord is your strength.”

Mary and Joseph made it through that difficult night because the Lord was with them. I’m convinced they drew strength from the joy of the Lord—a joy deeper than comfort or ease.

The Shepherds Visit

Luke 2:8-20

What comes to mind when you think of the word 'shepherd'?

King David, a shepherd before any of his mighty accomplishments.

Today, we have a beautiful connection with shepherds...however, that is not the image that would have come to mind for the original audience of Luke.

In the first century, shepherds were not associated with incredible watercolors adorning offices and nurseries alike. The opposite. Shepherding was considered a low and undesirable position. Some scholars at the time would go so far as to say shepherds were even despised and/or distrusted because of their traveling lifestyle and the inability to remain ritually clean.

To say the least: they were considered "outsiders" socially. Shepherds were the job people would crinkle their noses at. So now with our first-century noggins on, we begin Luke chapter 2...

WOW!

The messiah is born!

Jesus Christ!

THE SON OF GOD!

Here in the flesh!

And we read the next line....

Drumroll moment....

The king of kings is here...

And...Shepherds?!

THAT is who the LORD God decided to intimately reveal this grand moment all of creation had been leading up to?!

He decided to give a private concert of angels singing His heavenly glory...to smelly, lowly, "undesirable" shepherds?! Let's really let that sink in.

God decided to announce His Son...to one of the lowest worldly positions you could think of at the time.

The shepherds did not push back against God for choosing them. They did not "clean up" at any point in this angelic moment of glory. Further, when "...they spread the word..." (Luke 2:17) they did not change their occupation as "all...were amazed at what the shepherds said..." (Luke 2:18).

Because ultimately, this story has nothing to do with the shepherds.

Instead, it has everything to do with the God who sent His one and only Son.

It has everything to do with the God who decided the people most fit for this grand moment of celebration...were the shepherds.

Wow.

DAY 17

The Presentation in the Temple

Luke 2:22-35

Joy continues to be our focus this week. Today's reading presents an interesting scene. Imagine first-time parents traveling six miles from Bethlehem to Jerusalem's Temple with their newborn son. Jewish law required every firstborn male be consecrated at the Temple. Mary, post-partum, likely walked or rode a donkey—neither choice, a pleasant one. As parents of the Christ child, were they overwhelmed, nervous, tired, hungry, and forced to purchase lowly birds? Did they feel shame bringing birds instead of a lamb for their offering? Do these facts present joy?

At the Temple, they meet Simeon, a man led by the Holy Spirit, who recognizes baby Jesus as the promised Messiah. He takes the baby from Mary and begins praising God! He declares he can now die in peace because God's promise has been fulfilled: to meet the Messiah before his death. Simeon is joyful. He experienced God's faithfulness! Simeon then prophesies—Jesus is our salvation and a light to the Gentiles. The parents were amazed! But Simeon continues, addressing Mary directly. He predicts the child will cause many in Israel to fall. Jesus will be opposed. Simeon concludes: a sword will pierce your very soul.

Again, these facts don't present joy! The point is that many of us walk through life this way. When we focus on ourselves or life's hardships, joy diminishes. Happiness differs from joy—happiness is circumstance-driven and fleeting. Joy remains constant because it comes from our relationship with Christ, not our circumstances.

Simeon knew this. He experienced joy, sustained through God's promise of the Messiah bringing salvation to all nations. He witnessed God's faithfulness and found complete joy through the Holy Spirit.

We don't know what Mary and Joseph felt that day, but they weren't clueless about Jesus' identity. They had witnessed God's presence and faithfulness repeatedly. Although they didn't know everything that would transpire, they knew Jesus' purpose. Their joy was complete in being chosen by God, and they trusted His plan. God is our Creator, Lord, Savior, and Deliverer. He never changes, and if we trust Him, we don't face life's valleys with despair. We can claim confident hope that Jesus will deliver us, even from the deepest valley. Our strength, contentment, and joy come through Him.

Psalm 33:20-22 and Romans 15:13 are my favorite verses that bring joy in uncertain circumstances. I pray you experience the joy of the season by claiming confident hope in Christ.

Simeon's Song

Luke 2.29-32

There are many songs throughout Scripture, and all of them, in one way or another, exalt God's character, faithfulness, holiness, and sovereignty. The Song of Simeon, known in Latin as the Nunc Dimittis ("Now you let your servant go"), is no different.

This brief but powerful song flowed from the heart of an old man who had waited his entire life for one sacred moment: to see the Lord's promised Messiah before he died. As Simeon held the infant Jesus in his arms, he knew that God had kept His word. The long-awaited Savior had come and with Him came peace.

Simeon's declaration is the Gospel in miniature. He proclaims that he has seen salvation itself, not as an idea or a doctrine, but as a person, Jesus Christ. The baby he cradled was God's rescue plan wrapped in human flesh.

And this salvation, Simeon sings, is for all people. The good news of Jesus is not hidden or reserved for a select few, but instead it is open, visible, and available to everyone who believes. In Christ, the light of heaven pierces the darkness of the world. He reveals God to those who never knew Him and fulfills the ancient hope of Israel. Jesus is both the Light of the world and the Glory of God's people.

Although Scripture doesn't outline what she did right after her husband's passing, we can assume she went to the Temple straightaway. Instead of letting grief overtake her, she spent decades dedicated to the Lord. Through her sorrow, she chose JOY.

Perhaps we could learn a lesson or two from Anna. I wonder what our life would be like if we chose JOY in the midst of our grief, sadness, or in the waiting. Sometimes we have to initially choose joy even when we don't necessarily feel like it.

Leading up to this moment, Jesus has just been born. Anna arrived just in time to witness Simeon's blessing of baby Jesus (verses 25-35). What a holy moment that must have been. Scripture tells us that Anna's first reaction was to thank God because Jesus was the One she had been waiting for. Then she went to share it with everyone. She recognized the miracle she had just witnessed and couldn't keep it to herself.

After a lifetime of waiting, Anna was able to experience the truest form of JOY by meeting her Savior in the flesh. The one she had worshipped in the Temple for years prior, she now saw face to face. Getting to spread the good news of Immanuel, the Messiah, the Redeemer, and the One who would fulfill all the prophecies – Anna was truly blessed. Now, that is a Christmas miracle!

DAY 20

The Visit of the Magi

Matthew 2:1-12

When the Lord comes, will you be ready?

In Matthew 2, we read of King Herod, the Israelites, and the Magi's reactions to the birth of Jesus - his first arrival. In verse 3, the Magi - highly respected astronomers in their time - immediately share this good news with King Herod, expecting him to share in their excitement. This is not what we read. Not only is Herod terrified, but most of Jerusalem is as well. While King Herod's response makes sense given the threat to his power and reigning authority, the Israelites' disposition is puzzling. Why, after all this time waiting for the Messiah, aren't they compelled to celebrate their King has finally come?

From the Magi, we see a radically different response, one that's joyful and filled with hope. In verse 11, the Magi arrive to the house where Jesus is, and overcome, they kneel and worship Him. After the hundreds of years God's people were waiting for the Messiah, this seems like the proper response. From the moment the star appeared, to when they finally see Jesus, the Magi are spurred on by joy to meet their long-awaited King.

In our hearts, we hope to be like the Magi, yet we often struggle to get there. It's easy sometimes to criticize the Israelites for their fear, but if we're honest, we can be just like them. The difference between the Israelites and the Magi wasn't belief, but readiness. The Magi traveled hundreds of miles with expectant and joyful hearts, ready to worship and receive their King.

In our own waiting, we're graciously invited to remember God's promise to His people - fulfilled by the arrival of his son, Jesus, into the world. We're reminded our joy comes from God's character of faithfulness. That because of His faithfulness, we can have joy that leads to worship, like we see through the story of the Magi. Let us be expectantly joyful while we wait for our King's second arrival, and may we be a people who are ready to receive Him when He does.

DAY 21

The Gifts of the Wise Men

Matthew 2:11

Like every year, you are buying presents for loved ones you will gather with at Christmas. You put thought into what to get, personalizing every gift as a way of acknowledging who the recipient is and honoring your relationship with that person.

Matthew chapter 2 tells of wise men who followed a star to Bethlehem. They asked around where they could find Jesus. In Matthew 2:11, we read that when they found Him, they offered gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

Even more than what you will place around the tree this year, these three gifts to Jesus were intentional and rich with meaning, they were symbols of (1) who Jesus was, and (2) what He would accomplish.

Gold was a gift for royalty, and in presenting it the wise men acknowledged that Jesus was a King. Frankincense was a gift for deity, and the wise men recognized that Jesus was indeed the Son of God. Myrrh was a spice used to anoint a body for a funeral, and the wise men foreshadowed the death of Jesus.

These three gifts ask three profound questions, ones you and I, and every living person, must answer in our time on earth. The gold asks if we believe that Jesus is indeed a King, that He rules over every part of creation. The frankincense asks if we believe that Jesus is the Son of God, the one true God, sent from Heaven. The myrrh asks if we believe in the death of Jesus and the reason for it- that He died for our sins, so that in believing in Him we can be reconciled to God.

DAY 22

The Light of the World

John 1:1-14

Hundreds of people will light candles, illuminating the room and declare that Jesus is the light of the world. Darkness cannot exist in the presence of light. Light rules over darkness. Jesus declares in John 8:12, “I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life.”

May we walk in the light of Christ this Advent season and carry the light with us everywhere we go. May the Prince of Peace rule and reign in our hearts as we face this season and all it may bring. Finally, I pray for joy and laughter to fill your home as you are illuminated by the hope of Christ.

Christmas Day - Celebrating the Incarnation

John 1:14

“The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth”(John 1:14, NIV).

This verse succinctly and perfectly describes for us the summit of Scripture regarding the incarnation of Jesus. All of who God is and wants to display to His people is made tangible by the person of Jesus Christ. All the glory of God is found in a baby born in a cave and laid in manger on one starry night.

The word “dwelling” has so much rich and theological depth to it. This moment fulfills a deep, ancient longing written into the very fabric of creation. In Genesis 1, God formed the heavens and the earth not simply as a universe of order and beauty, but as a cosmic temple — a sacred space where He would dwell with His image-bearers. The garden was meant to be a meeting place of heaven and earth, Creator and creation. But sin fractured that fellowship. Humanity left the garden; God’s presence became veiled behind the curtain of the temple.

Then came Jesus. The Word became flesh and “tabernacled” among us — echoing the Old Testament tabernacle where God’s presence once rested in the midst of His people. Only this time, there was no tent or temple required. He Himself was the meeting place between heaven and earth. In Christ, the cosmic temple is restored. God’s glory once again fills the world through His presence — not in a building, but in a person.

Jesus is the fulfillment of God’s perfect love. This is the love of God made visible — love that doesn’t shout from afar, but steps close, takes on flesh, and moves into the neighborhood. Heaven has come home to earth.
