WHAT DOES GOD WANT US TO DO?

Pastor Matt said, “See the land between is the space of unwanted transitions. It’s not something you choose. It’s not something you ask for. But suddenly, you’re there trying to adjust, trying to survive. You find yourself in a season where answers are not immediate, where the future is unclear. A season of waiting. This is the land between. And in a broken world, we can be sure of this: The land Between: All of us have been there, are there, or will be there.”

Describe a period of your life when you had to spend time in “The Land Between.” What were you waiting for? How was your time of enduring?

While you’re waiting on the Lord, what else can you be focusing on?

What does God want us to do? Flowing out of our reading and interpretation, what action does this passage or the Spirit’s leading, nudging us toward?

WHAT DOES GOD WANT ME TO DO?

Pastor Matt said, “This kind of presence points beyond itself. It becomes a living picture of something greater, the gospel of Jesus Christ. Because at the center of the Christian story is not a God who avoids suffering, but a God who enters it. Jesus does not stand at a distance from the land between. He steps into it. He enters the waiting. He walks into the grief. He sits in the darkness. He bears the weight.”

Why is it sometimes easier to see God’s sovereignty at work after a time of waiting is over than when you’re in the middle of it?

What are you currently waiting for the Lord to do in your life? How would you like the body of Christ to surround you during this time of waiting? Who can you support in this way during his or her time of waiting on the Lord?

What does God want ME to do? What is the personal application and action step that the Holy Spirit is calling you toward?
