A Choral Feast: Music of Handel for Choir & Orchestra

SUNDAY, JUNE 22 AT 11 AM

St. Bartholomew's Choir will present music of George Frederic Handel, his Chandos Anthem "O Praise the Lord with one consent," composed 1717-18. This is one of eleven works written when Handel served as composer-in-residence for the future First Duke of Chandos. They combine verses of the Psalms in a lively translation created in 1696 by Nahum Tate and Nicholas Brady. The work is scored for choir, soloists, and orchestra of strings, oboes, and organ, which will be performed on period instruments.


