A Note from Pastor Jasmine

At the beginning of Lent a few weeks ago, I shared in the children's moment about "burying the Alleluia." During the season of Lent, our music and liturgy does not feature this word which is a proclamation of praise and rejoicing. I grew up in a church that did not recognize Lent as a season, instead there would usually be a pretty dramatic retelling of the crucifixion and then an elaborate Easter celebration.

In recent years, I'm so grateful for the opportunity to join Christians around the world who journey with Jesus in the season of Lent, in-

cluding in the practice of our music selections. Giving the alleluias a rest for the season builds the anticipation for when we get to bring them out again, reminding us all that there are some seasons in life when our sorrow will cloud the sense of joy. But the resurrection hope is always at the back of our mind, not forgotten.

Lent is often a time we remember Jesus' forty days in the wilderness before beginning his ministry (from Luke's gospel). In today's passage from Mark, we have similar themes of hunger in the desert. Often these passages have multiple layers of meaning: there is of course the physical hunger, but there is also spiritual hunger, and that is what has drawn these crowds to Jesus. Jesus is the bread of life, and he extends that by both physically feeding the people, and spiritually providing them with everlasting life and abundance.

This season of 40 days (plus Sundays) is just long enough to get us through the end of winter here in Michigan. When everything around us seems dead, and it seems like life will never bloom again, we have to remind ourselves that spring will come. Our alleluias will come again. But for now, we look to the cross, recognizing the suffering in the world and in our own lives, and that God is with us even when the alleluias are hidden or buried. And that is good news. Thanks be to God, even (or especially) when our alleluias are hard to find.



INFORMATION ON TODAY'S SERVICES

About the Music: Georg Philipp Telemann (1681-1767) was almost completely self-taught in music, having become a composer against his family's wishes. He entered the University of Leipzig to study law but changed his career to music and became music director for Hamburg's five main churches in 1721. One of the most prolific composers in history, he was favorably regarded in comparison to his friend Johann Sebastian Bach, (who named him godfather and namesake to his son Carl Philipp Emanuel), as well as to Handel, whom he also knew. His music is regarded as an important link between the late Baroque and early Classical styles.

Our Invitation Hymn for the Children's Message was a collaborative effort by Edwin Estevez and Marilyn Biery. At the January staff retreat of the worship leaders, Marilyn asked Edwin for the words of invitation and later set it to music.

Charles-François Gounod (1818 – 1893), usually known as Charles Gounod, was a French composer. He wrote twelve operas, of which the most popular has always been Faust (1859). He composed a large amount of church music, many songs, and popular short pieces including his "Ave Maria," where he wrote a melody that juxtaposed the Ave Maria text onto the first (C Major) Prelude of Bach's *Well Tempered Clavier*. His song *Repentir* ("O Divine Redeemer"), for mezzosoprano and orchestra, was published posthumously in 1894.

Sir Charles Hubert Hastings Parry (1848 – 1918), was an English composer, teacher and music historian. Born in Richmond Hill, Bournemouth, Parry's first major works appeared in 1880. He is best known for the hymn tune Jerusalem, found in our hymnal twice, his coronation anthem "I Was Glad, and the hymn tune Repton which also appears in our hymnal to two different texts. It forms the basis for our offertory anthem, "Dear Lord and Father of Mankind." The lines "Take from our souls the strain and stress/ And let our ordered lives confess/The beauty of thy peace" are a powerful mantra for the season of Lent.
