



A Note from Sarah Ford

Do you know you'll only find the actual account of palm waving in the book of John? The scripture we lean on today in worship is from the book of Luke and in that account, people spread their cloaks on the road for Jesus, out of respect, hope, expectation. Leaning on all four gospels, we have a picture of Jesus riding on a donkey into Jerusalem, people putting cloaks on the road, waving palms in the air, shouting "Hosanna!" A few days later, Jesus again predicts his death, overturns tables in the temple, hosts the Last Supper, is betrayed, arrested, crucified, buried, and resurrected. That's a lot.

These are the core memories of faith stories and faith practices (ie. palm waving on Palm Sunday) that we engage with as Christians. Did your children (or grandchildren, or spouse, or friend, or colleague) ask you, "Why do you/we wave palms?" Have you considered the question yourself? How did you answer it?

Can we be worshipful and reverent in palm waving instead of traditionalists and really think through what this is all about? Kids pick up on what's authentic. They are truth seekers and truth tellers. Jesus tells us to have child-life faith, not childish faith, child-like faith. Children seek the truth, let's give it to them. The palms can be a reminder of a people who loved Jesus in one minute and turned away from him in the next. How does that story affect us? They wanted something different than what Jesus was offering, and they quickly realized he wasn't the king they were looking for. We can be like that. One moment our faith is strong and in the next, we're filled with doubt. Maybe that's not you, maybe that's me. Maybe that's a little bit of you. But whatever it is, let's be honest with it. Our faith requires contemplation, consideration, questions, doubts, learning, exploring, failing, believing, sharing, realism, hope, repentance, belief, truth, honesty of heart, a leap in something we trust is true even if we can't touch it all the time. Faith is the real deal, and Jesus isn't messing around. Are we waving the palms at him for *real* or are we going through the motions?

When we wave the palms today, or when someone asks us why we do this, I encourage all of us to stop, pause, reflect, think for a moment, maybe breathe a prayer – and answer authentically. We wave the palms because without the palms, it's hard to reflect on what happened when Jesus came into Jerusalem to do what he had to do. The palms are easy for us to hold, they serve as a tool. We all remember better through symbols.

Today, palms are a symbol of life, resilience, and prosperity. We can wave them in thanks and in praise. We can wave them in joy that we're here now, and didn't live in Biblical times; we can wave them in gratitude that we know how the story ends.

Let your kids, your grandkids, your spouse, your friend, your colleague in on why you wave the palms, even if you're not sure, and definitely if you are. I am grateful that Jesus, the One, with all of his grace, offers indelible hope, indelible life, and an unimaginable quench of love everlasting in my heart, even on the worst days. That's enough to make me want to wave my palm and have a sword fight with my kids because I'm happy, and he makes it so.



INFORMATION ON TODAY'S SERVICES

About the Music:The opening voluntary by J.S. Bach is based on the tune we sing as the processional hymn, *Valet will ich dir geben.* Bach used the tune several times in his organ music, and this festive setting prepares us to sing our opening hymn as we wave our palm branches in celebration. The combined choirs will sing an anthem arranged by Roberta Bitgood (1908-2007), an American organist, choir director and composer. She was the first woman to serve as president of the American Guild of Organists, elected in 1975. She lived in Michigan for a time, serving as violist with the Battle Creek Symphony Orchestra and organist at the First Congregational Church in Battle Creek.

The Prayer for Illumination is set to a Scottish hymn tune named ELGIN. Not much is known about this tune, which was first published in the Scottish Psalter of 1564, which was the first psalter or psalm book to be published in Scotland. It was published by the Church of Scotland under the influence of John Knox as part of the Book of Common Order.

The Benediction Response is based on the Scottish tune culross, named for a village and former royal burgh, and parish, in Fife, Scotland. The composer of the tune is not known; it first appeared in the Scottish Psalter.
