



A Note from Pastor Jim

LOW Sunday, that's the term we often use to describe Sunday following the joyful throngs filling the pews on Easter. With the pageantry now past, Sunday morning returns to its usual patterns. This begs several questions of us. The first is to imagine what church might look like, sound like, and be like if the "Easter" congregation showed up every Sunday. It would be crowded in the pews and challenging to find space in our Sunday School for the overflow of youngsters. More cups of coffee, more cookies, more teachers, more of just about everything would be necessary to provide for the increase in people. And, along with these things to ponder is a second deeper question... What kind of church would we be building if we had an abundance of everything we think we need? That's the

question I'm hoping to address in this Sunday's sermon.

What we build and how we build our fellowship today, I believe, determines our mission, viability and legacy for tomorrow. I found this same lesson to be at the very core of the Three Little Pigs story. As a matter of faithfulness Paul speaks to this in his letter to the Christians when he writes...

"By the grace God has given me, I laid the foundation as a wise builder and someone else is building on it. But each of you should build with care... For your work will be shown for what it is because the 'Day of the Lord' will bring it to light..."

The moral of the story of the Three Little Pigs, as you already know, is about building a strong house, one that can survive the various challenges symbolized by the Big Bad Wolf. Perhaps this story can also serve as a powerful metaphor for the discernment and dedication and spiritual depth required to build a ministry that endures and blesses future generations.

About the Music: Our Invitation Hymn for the Children's Message was a collaborative effort by Jasmine Smart and Marilyn Biery. At the January staff retreat of the worship leaders, Marilyn asked Pastor Jasmine for the words of invitation and later set it to music.

The Hallelujah! by James Biery was commissioned by Dorothy Perkins for the memorial service for the Rev. Alfred L. Perkins in 2002. Al Perkins was Marilyn Biery's father; a Presbyterian minister who served in the Blackhawk Presbytery in Illinois, and who graduated from Louisville Seminary.

Judas Maccabaeus is an oratorio in three parts by G. F. Handel. The first performance took place on 1 April 1747 at the Royal Opera House in London, and Judas Maccabaeus became one of Handel's most popular oratorios.
