





A Note from the Pastor

Water has always drawn me. Perhaps its attraction is partly the result of my zodiac sign, Pisces, or having grown up around the Danube river in Ulm, Germany. It's probably no coincidence that I opted to buy a condo that overlooks water which reflects the sky and adjoining trees.

Today's scripture takes place at a pool by one of Jerusalem's city gates. The gate, called the Sheep Gate, is used mostly to funnel livestock in and out of the city. And since the air is filled with the animals' stench, most people avoid going near it. And yet, an entire throng of people is camped out along the pool's five porticos. They

are on mats and makeshift pallets. They lie outstretched all day or are curled up there even overnight. All of them are invalids, people weighted down by illness, physical handicap, or disease. And they are there in hopes of being healed. Local lore has it that the pool's waters have healing powers. And so they wait, day in, day out, until the waters are suddenly churned and they are able to climb into the pool and possibly be made well.

There are many stories in Scripture about the power of water and its healing effects. The world is created out of water. Moses leads the Israelites across the waters of the Red Sea into freedom from captivity. Joshua takes his people across the Jordan River into the Promised Land. And John baptizes in the Jordan while calling people to repentance.

The Gospel of John is replete with images of water too. Jesus is seen as turning water into wine at a wedding. He heals a woman at a well and sets her free from shame. And he allows the lame man by the pool to walk again. That's because Jesus IS the living water and the fountain of eternal life.

Some years ago, I wrote a hymn titled "Waters of Peace." Here are the two opening stanzas:

When I wake up in the morning, Grant me your peace.
When the light of day is dawning, Grant me your peace.
I am waiting for your filling:
Keeping still and being willing for your cleansing and distilling waters of peace.

When I interact with others,
Grant me your peace.
When demands and duties bother,
Grant me your peace.
I'm on earth as your reflection,
Serving under your protection
By my speech and love in action,
all for your peace. . . .

May Christ anoint your lips so you serve as his waters of peace.



INFORMATION ON TODAY'S SERVICES

About the Music: Helen Howarth Hemmel was born in 1863 in Wardle, England, and died in 1961 in Seattle, Washington. Hemmel was the daughter of a Methodist minister; her family emigrated to the United States when she was 12 years old. They first settled in Mississippi, then relocated to Wisconsin. She moved to Seattle in 1904, and for three years was music critic for the Seattle Post-Intelligencer. While interviewing German singer Ernestine Schumann-Heink, Helen was persuaded to go to Europe. A gifted singer, she studied music in Germany for four years. Upon her return to America, she began giving concerts and traveling on the Chautauqua circuit.

Mary Louise (Mel) Bringle is Professor of Philosophy and Religious Studies and chair of the Humanities Division at Brevard College (Brevard, NC). A teacher at heart and a theologian by training (with a Ph.D. from Emory University and an assortment of publications in pastoral theology), she began writing hymn texts in 1999. Her texts and translations are included in publications from numerous denominations, including Presbyterian, Roman Catholic, Mennonite, Evangelical Lutheran Church of America, Episcopalian, United Church of Canada, and Church of Scotland. She served as President of The Hymn Society and chair of the committee to create our *Glory to God* hymnal for the Presbyterian Church USA.

Bringle's text was set to music by Kate Williams, Vice President of Sacred Music at GIA Publications, Inc. She holds a Bachelor of Music Composition degree from DePaul University in Chicago, Illinois as well as a Master of Arts in Liturgical Studies degree from Catholic Theological Union in the Hyde Park neighborhood of Chicago where it was her privilege to study as a distinguished Bernardin Scholar. Williams commissioned this setting from James Biery and it will be published by GIA in the coming year.
