



A Note from Rev. Dr. Edwin Estevez

In the Torah, the collection of the Five Books of Moses, the first book is aptly named Genesis, from the Greek, for beginning. We are told that at the beginning of creation, the Spirit of God hovered over the waters. The Hebrew word used there, *ruach*, can mean breath, wind, or be related to spirit. In fact, we too derive one of our English words for breathing—respiration—from the Latin word for spirit. This "wind, breath, or spirit" of God is made manifest throughout the Older Testament—the Hebrew Scriptures—descending upon people of faith like prophets and judges—enlivening the Word of God, leveling social criticisms, calling all to repentance, and enabling faithful action.

There's even a promise in the prophetic Book of Joel:

Then afterward
I will pour out my spirit on all flesh;
your sons and your daughters shall prophesy,
your old men shall dream dreams,
and your young men shall see visions.
Even on the male and female servants,
in those days I will pour out my Spirit. (2: 28-29)

This is what some scholars call "the democratization of faith." The Spirit of God would not just fall on a ruling class (kings) or an elite education class (priests), or just the wealthy and powerful families, but on all people, young and old, male and female, of all backgrounds. On Pentecost, the Early Church proclaimed that this had come to pass and was inclusive of all cultures—hence all the languages spoken. (Book of Acts 2:5-12) This was a prophetic promise fulfilled, just as Jesus had said: ...the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all that I have said to you." (Gospel of John 14: 26).

Pentecost is called the birthday celebration of the Church because it's the day when the Good News of Jesus Christ became more than information and led to transformation of a motley crew of believers and followers, to the Body of Christ—apostles, evangelists, teachers, leaders—whom the Spirit would use to change the world. We are a part of a movement started and instituted by Christ over 2,000 years ago, but a part of the larger movement of God at the beginning of creation—the Spirit hovering over the waters, enabling life throughout. This movement has led to the first public hospitals and orphanages, the care of the needy and sick, global mechanisms and institutions for peace, and even animating the struggle for human rights and freedoms. This has been the wind of change.

So, what does a change of wind look like for the Church today, and Kirk in the Hills specifically? Or as you heard last week, what would the outpouring of the Holy Spirit look like today, for us at the Kirk, here and now? Prayerfully, let us invite this wind to disrupt all in us that is stale, obstinate, and dead, and let it revive, renew, restore, refresh, and reform us into the fullness of the people of God.



INFORMATION ON TODAY'S SERVICES

About the Music: The Pentecost Introit was written in 2025 by Marilyn Biery for today's service. The choir recites a mantra on the Latin text *Veni*, *Sancte Spiritus*, while three soloists sing *Come*, *Holy Spirit* in English, Spanish and Chinese.

The Prayer for Illumination is a bilingual prayer taken from the *Book of Common Worship* published by the Presbyterian Church USA and set to a traditional Gregorian Chant (for the 12th Sunday in Ordinary time) by Marilyn Biery.

The Personent Hodie tune, which is in our hymnal to a Christmas text, was originally published in the *Piae Cantiones*, a collection of medieval Latin songs, in 1582. It is believed to be of medieval origin, with a similar melody found in a German manuscript from 1360. Marilyn Biery asked Latin expert Maryann Corbett (St. Paul, MN) for a translation of the Veni, Sancte Spiritus text (Come, Holy Spirit), a 13th century Latin poem which is sung or recited on Pentecost Sunday in the Catholic liturgy; Marilyn worked from Maryann's translation to create a text to fit this tune.

Sir William Henry Harris (1883 – 1973) was an English organist, and composer whose works were written in the Anglican tradition. Between 1923 and 1953 Harris served as a professor of organ and harmony at the Royal College of Music. He was also president of the Royal College of Organists (1946–8), and director of musical studies at the Royal School of Church Music (1956–61).

The choral response is a traditional Arabic greeting with music written by Richard Bruxvoort Colligan in 2004. It can be found in our hymnal, #448.
