

A Note from Rev. Dr. Charles B. Hardwick

Grace and Peace! I'm thankful for the chance to preach today. I'm the executive for the Synod of the Covenant, the collection of eleven presbyteries in Ohio and Michigan. Our offices are in the Abbey. I'm always grateful for opportunities to join in your ministry.

Our scripture today, Luke 13:10-17, tells the story of Jesus healing someone whom commentators often call the "stooped woman." She has been unable to stand up straight for eighteen years. On the Sabbath, Jesus heals her, and then promptly gets into a disagreement

with the head of the synagogue. In my sermon I'm going to be focusing mostly on that disagreement, so I thought I'd focus on the unnamed woman here.

First of all, calling her the "stooped woman" bugs me. It reduces her to her illness. We don't refer to a friend as the "cancer-riddled man" or the "arthritic woman," so let's give her respect and think about her as Jesus did, a "dear woman." She's a child of God with other sorrows, joys, hopes, and dreams. When we are at our best, we recognize the full humanity of people who are beset with terrible illnesses.

Secondly, I love that Jesus approaches her, rather than vice versa. In most miracle stories in the Gospels, it is the person seeking healing who approaches Jesus, perhaps with the help of friends. Here, though, we see Jesus taking the initiative—seeing her condition, calling her over, and touching her. "Instantly, she could stand straight" (Luke 13:12). I love the mixture of these stories; they remind us that while most of the time we bring our concerns to Jesus, sometimes he answers our prayers even before we lift them up.

Finally, if you or someone you love are seeking miraculous healing, I pray that Jesus gives it to you. He certainly continues to work miracles. It's a mystery, though, why these miracles don't come to everyone. Jesus did not heal everyone who suffered even while he was ministering in Israel, and he does not heal everyone now. It's somehow a sign of grace when miracles come, but not a grace that we all receive. I don't think we'll ever understand why. I pray we'll remember that a lack of healing miracles does not mean a lack of love, and that Jesus offers the miracle of walking beside us to all of us. Lo, he is with us always, even to the end of the age. (Matthew 28:20, alt.)



About the music: Maria Theresia von Paradis (1759–1824) was an Austrian musician and composer who lost her sight at an early age. She was well-known as a singer and pianist in Vienna, and had an excellent memory and exceptionally accurate hearing. She was widely reported to have learned over 60 concertos by heart, as well as a large repertoire of solo and religious works. She also composed a considerable amount of music. The beautiful Sicilienne (originally for violin and piano) is ascribed to her.
