

FOR SUCH A TIME AS THIS "Defending the Vulnerable" Esther 8:3-8, 9:1-19 December 29, 2024

Observations of Haman's Edict on the Jews in Persian Society:

- 1. The Jews were in a <u>helpless</u> position before the second edict where they were to be destroyed with no ability to <u>defend</u> themselves.
- 2. Haman's <u>death</u> is not enough to stop the edict to destroy the Jews or a portion of the population's <u>desire</u> to destroy the Jews.
- 3. The shift in Mordecai's new position made the <u>government</u> that was to administer the original edict now administer the second edict to <u>help</u> the Jews.
- 4. The Jews response was not to become an <u>aggressor</u> for gaining dominion but an <u>aggressor</u> to defend their lives.
- 5. The Jews celebrated the deliverance and initiated a holiday.

How the Jewish Response should challenge Christians today:

- 1. Stand up for the helpless.
- 2. Policy can not fix evil.
- 3. <u>Aggression</u> towards evil could be the only way to push back evil.
- 4. Celebrate God's deliverance.

RESPONSE QUESTIONS:

- 1. How does the reversal of the first decree demonstrate God's ability to bring hope and redemption even in dire circumstances? (*Esther* 8:11–14)
- 2. How does the Jews' victory over their enemies reflect God's faithfulness to protect His people? (Esther 9:1-5)
- 3. Why was it significant that the Jews refrained from taking the plunder, and what does this teach us about integrity in victory? (*Esther* 9:10, 15–16)
- 4. How does the establishment of Purim as a celebration of deliverance encourage us to remember God's acts of faithfulness in our lives? *(Esther 9:20–22)*
