Worship note

Easter is the principal feast of the Christian year, in which we celebrate Christ's victory over death and the grave. We celebrate the Paschal Mystery every Sunday, but in this 50-day season of Eastertide, resurrection has a particular focus. You will notice bright and festive hymnody, prayers from a wonderful resource called Rites and Rituals, and the familiar Eucharistic Prayer, known as "Prayer A." This quotation seems especially poignant: "We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O God, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts" (BCP p. 363)

May this season fill you with Easter joy, which speaks life into the face of death. Alleluia! Christ is risen.

The First Lesson | Acts 3:12-19

Peter addressed the people, “You Israelites, why do you wonder at this, or why do you stare at us, as though by our own power or piety we had made him walk? Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have.” And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. 
