The First Lesson | Exodus 3:1-15

Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian; he led his flock beyond the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed. Then Moses said, "I must turn aside and look at this great sight, and see why the bush is not burned up." When the Lord saw that he had turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, "Moses, Moses!" And he said, "Here I am." Then he said, "Come no closer! Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground." He said further, "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." And Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God.

Then the Lord said, "I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters. Indeed, I know their sufferings, and I have come down to deliver them from the Egyptians, and to bring them up out of that land to a good and broad land, a land flowing with milk and honey, to the country of the Canaanites, the Hittites, the Amorites, the Perizzites, the Hivites, and the Jebusites. The cry of the Israelites has now come to me; I have also seen how the Egyptians oppress them. So come, I will send you to Pharaoh to bring my people, the Israelites, out of Egypt." But Moses said to God, "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh, and bring the Israelites out of Egypt?" He said, "I will be with you; and this shall be the sign for you that it is I who sent you: when you have brought the people out of Egypt, you shall worship God on this mountain."

But Moses said to God, "If I come to the Israelites and say to them, 'The God of your ancestors has sent me to you,' and they ask me, 'What is his name?' what shall I say to them?" God said to Moses, "I am who I am." He said further, "Thus you shall say to the Israelites, 'I am has sent me to you.'" God also said to Moses, "Thus you shall say to the Israelites, 'The Lord, the God of your ancestors, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has sent me to you':

The Second Lesson | 1 Corinthians 10:1-13 | 11:15 a.m.

I do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, that our ancestors were all under the cloud, and all passed through the sea, and all were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea, and all ate the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink. For they drank from the spiritual rock that followed them, and the rock was Christ. Nevertheless, God was not pleased with most of them, and they were struck down in the wilderness.

Now these things occurred as examples for us, so that we might not desire evil as they did. Do not become idolaters as some of them did; as it is written, "The people sat down to eat and drink, and they rose up to play." We must not indulge in sexual immorality as some of them did, and twenty-three thousand fell in a single day. We must not put Christ to the test, as some of them did, and were destroyed by serpents. And do not complain as some of them did, and were destroyed by the destroyer. These things happened to them to serve as an example, and they were written down to instruct us, on whom the ends of the ages have come. So if you think you are standing, watch out that you do not fall. No testing has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing he will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it.

COMPOSER OF THE WEEK Undine Eliza Anna Smith Moore, the “Dean of Black Women Composers,” was an American composer and professor of music in the twentieth century. Moore was originally trained as a classical pianist, but developed a compositional output of mostly vocal music—her preferred genre. Much of her work was inspired by black spirituals and folk music. Undine Smith Moore was a renowned teacher, and once stated that she experienced “teaching itself as an art.”



STATIONS OF THE CROSS | During Lent, original art representing the fourteen Stations of the Cross is installed in the All Saints’ nave by the Arts Theology Committee. The stations refer to fourteen key events at the end of Jesus’ life, from the moment he is condemned to die, through his suffering, death on the cross, and burial. During Sunday worship in Lent, we pray that this art may serve as a visual storyteller, and a companion in prayer as we walk the Way of the Cross.

SUMMARY OF JANUARY VESTRY MEETING

The Vestry met on Wednesday, February 19, 2025, at 4:30 PM.

Sheldon Taylor provided the Treasurer's Report:

- Pledges in January exceeded the budget while Buildings & Grounds, Security, and Personnel continue to be key focus areas.
- The 2025 Budget remains balanced. It has been reviewed and approved by the Budget subcommittee and Finance committee.

Simon Mainwaring discussed the parochial report, provided an update on refugee ministries, and shared the progress of the master planning efforts:

- The annual Parochial Report for All Saints' Episcopal Church has been completed, signed, and submitted.

- With federal support reduced from six months to one, additional fundraising for this core ministry is necessary and is exceeding expectations. The church plans to continue supporting six families with rent and expenses for six months.
- Block Discernment & Master Plan: The final report is expected in May, outlining a long-term vision. Grant funding to support the study is still being pursued. The vestry will hold a special meeting in April to receive and discuss the steering committee's recommendations. The master plan will be presented to the parish on Sunday May 4.

Julie Lockhart provided the staff update. Stewardship efforts are focused on welcoming newcomers, analyzing pledge data and behaviors, and assisting parishioners in understanding all of their giving options.

The Vestry also discussing the upcoming, major church events including Shrove Tuesday, Ash Wednesday, Palm Sunday, and Easter services, with an emphasis on full participation in all.
