The First Lesson | Amos 7:7-17

This is what the Lord God showed me: the Lord was standing beside a wall built with a plumb line, with a plumb line in his hand. And the Lord said to me, "Amos, what do you see?" And I said, "A plumb line." Then the Lord said,

"See, I am setting a plumb line in the midst of my people Israel; I will never again pass them by; the high places of Isaac shall be made desolate,

and the sanctuaries of Israel shall be laid waste,

and I will rise against the house of Jeroboam with the sword."

Then Amaziah, the priest of Bethel, sent to King Jeroboam of Israel, saying, "Amos has conspired against you in the very center of the house of Israel; the land is not able to bear all his words. For thus Amos has said,

'Jeroboam shall die by the sword, and Israel must go into exile away from his land.'"

And Amaziah said to Amos, "O seer, go, flee away to the land of Judah, earn your bread there, and prophesy there; but never again prophesy at Bethel, for it is the king's sanctuary, and it is a temple of the kingdom."

Then Amos answered Amaziah, "I am no prophet, nor a prophet's son; but I am a herdsman, and a dresser of sycamore trees, and the Lord took me from following the flock, and the Lord said to me, `Go, prophesy to my people Israel.'

"Now therefore hear the word of the Lord.
You say, `Do not prophesy against Israel,
and do not preach against the house of Isaac.'
Therefore thus says the Lord:
`Your wife shall become a prostitute in the city,
and your sons and your daughters shall fall by the sword,
and your land shall be parceled out by line;
you yourself shall die in an unclean land,
and Israel shall surely go into exile away from its land."

The Second Lesson | Colossians 1:1-14

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and Timothy our brother,

To the saints and faithful brothers and sisters in Christ in Colossae:

Grace to you and peace from God our Father.

In our prayers for you we always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, for we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, because of the hope laid up for you in heaven. You have heard of this hope before in the word of the truth, the gospel that has come to you. Just as it is bearing fruit and growing in the whole world, so it has been bearing fruit among yourselves from the day you heard it and truly comprehended the grace of God. This you learned from Epaphras, our beloved fellow servant. He is a faithful minister of Christ on your behalf, and he has made known to us your love in the Spirit.

For this reason, since the day we heard it, we have not ceased praying for you and asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of God's will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, so that you may lead lives worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, as you bear fruit in every good work and as you grow in the knowledge of God. May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

The Gospel | Luke 10:25-37

GospelerThe Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Luke.PeopleGlory to you, Lord Christ.

Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live."

But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan while traveling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, `Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend.' Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

WORSHIP NOTES Much of the words of our worship today come from the *New Zealand Prayer Book*, with *Alternative Great Thanksgiving D* used for the Eucharistic Prayer. As you grow accustomed to using these words for our worship, you are encouraged to notice what grows within you. For the Lord's Prayer we pray for forgiveness of sins, rather than trespasses. As we break the bread we remember our oneness. The Eucharistic Prayer invites us to seek fulfillment in Christ's love, to reconcile and unite, and to find hope in our calling as followers of Jesus. We use these words of worship through the weeks of the summer as a reminder that we belong to a global church through the life and ministry of the Anglican Communion. As we enjoy the long days of summer light, sister churches in the southern hemisphere enter into the dark of winter; as we enjoy plenty in the Global North, our siblings in the Global South struggle for bread and justice. Though we are many, we are one body.

SUMMARY OF JUNE VESTRY MEETING

The Vestry met on Wednesday, June 25, 2025, at 4:30 PM.

Kate Stradtman opened the meeting and read a meditation from Melanie Hardin.

Sheldon Taylor provided the Treasurer's Update: noting that the balance sheet is in good shape and utility costs have decreased a bit recently due to the efforts to conserve energy in our buildings. He also reported that the annual audit of the church's financials is progressing smoothly.

Arjun Srinivasan, *Chair of the Board of Covenant Community*, provided a report on Covenant Community: He reviewed Covenant Community's three programs: the residential program (housing up to 12 men on our block); Recovery Resources of Atlanta-Midtown programming, which provides resources for addiction and sees approximately 1,200 people a month for resources; and the Sterne House, which is a transitional housing facility in Decatur. Arjun noted that Covenant Community's grant funding has been reduced by approximately \$800,000, which is half of its annual budget and has forced a staffing restructuring. He encouraged participation in weekly dinners on Monday evenings with the men of Covenant Community and asked All Saints' to consider continuing its financial support at historic levels.

The Vestry established two new committees and a task force to continue the next phase of the Future of the Block work: A Block Development Steering Committee, a Capital Campaign Steering Committee and the Egleston Ministry Center Task Force (for the creation of a costed design for a new Egleston Ministry Center).

Simon reported on the major initiatives that are planned for the upcoming church program year and reviewed the proposed assignments for Vestry members on committees and task forces for the next year.

The meeting closed with prayer and was adjourned.
