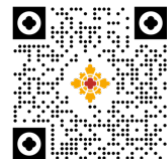



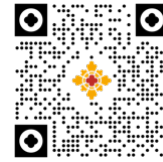

SUMMARY OF MAY VESTRY MEETING

The meeting opened with a prayer led by Simon, followed by a meditation offered by Briley Brisendine.

Simon reviewed vestry service assignments including expectations, meditation schedule, and meeting dates. Sheldon Taylor presented the Treasurer's Report, noting continued growth in the endowment fund. He also reported on the completion of an investment management review, which included a formal RFP process and subsequent interviews. Based on this work, a recommendation was made to transition investment management services to Northern Trust; the vestry approved this recommendation by vote.

Elizabeth Hale shared a statement outlining her and Sheffield's perspective on the future of the Egleston building, advocating for its preservation.

Wendy Little provided an update on the Lay Minister licensing process and obtained the required sign-offs from all present vestry members.

Meg Fogel gave an update on the Egleston Taskforce's progress, noting that the architectural team continues to develop a range of potential options and interventions. Current efforts are focused on refining programmatic requirements and associated cost estimates for each option.
