Membership and Attendance

First Baptist Columbia today is a community of approximately 500 members. The membership includes a diverse age range, predominantly identifies as white, and has a mix of partner orientation and gender identity. Sunday worship attendance is about 150 persons between our two services.

Faith origins among our church members vary widely. While a plurality began their faith journey within the Baptist denomination, over half of our members have backgrounds rooted in other denominations (Catholic, Episcopalian, Lutheran, Methodist, Presbyterian), non-denominational, and non-Christian backgrounds.


Finances


We are blessed with a faithful congregation that provides significant financial support to the budget of the church and for special offerings to fund specific needs. For 2024, our budget is \$880,000, which is supported by pledges, unpledged and loose offering, endowment income and parking revenue.

The generosity of past members has resulted in the establishment of professionally managed endowment, allowing their legacy to live on and to help First Baptist Church fulfill its mission to serve its members and our wider community.

Membership by Age










Columbia's Oldest Church – a 200-Year History

For two centuries, First Baptist Columbia has been a beacon of faith, hope and love. Established by 11 individuals in 1823, only two years after the city of Columbia was founded, our church has enjoyed a history filled with members who have led the way in progressive thought and action. Early leaders left indelible marks not only on the church, but also on our city, state and nation, championing ideals such as higher education and advancements in health care.

From its founding, First Baptist Columbia shared informal ties with other local Baptist churches and sent representatives to annual meetings. It joined the newly formed Southern Baptist Convention (SBC) in 1845, was actively involved with groups of Northern Baptists, and became dually aligned with SBC and the Northern Baptist Convention (later American Baptist Churches) in 1920. In 2000, First Baptist Columbia joined many churches across the country in severing ties with the SBC after the latter adopted an amendment deemphasizing the role of Jesus Christ and the role of personal experience in interpreting Scripture, and declared that women in SBC churches would not be allowed to serve as pastors. For the same reasons, the church mutually broke with the Missouri Baptist Convention soon thereafter.

While completing its first decade, church leaders assisted in founding what is now Stephens College – the second oldest women's college in the country and the city's first institution of higher education. A few short years later in 1839, state legislators voted to locate the University of Missouri to Columbia, a decision largely due to fundraising, donations and campaigning by members of First Baptist Columbia. Throughout the generations, many local higher education leaders and faculty have served as active

members and leaders among the congregation. This continued emphasis on education led to the establishement of the Child Development Center, which was located at the church from 1969-2020. The goal was to provide high-quality preschool education regardless of religious belief, ethnic background or socioeconomic status. While the center permanently closed following the COVID-19 pandemic, the church's support for education at all levels in our community remains.

Our History (continued)

Our commitment to the wider community began early, with the church separating from a Baptist association that had voiced its opposition to missions. This goal remains evident today through local partnerships with groups like Love Columbia and the Extra Mile House, support of missions in other countries, and a commitment to encouraging our pastors as they engage in denominational efforts.

The recent bicentennial of First Baptist Columbia provided the opportunity to learn – and also to acknowledge – more of our history. Our archives clearly show that several of our founders and many members were enslavers; sharing our history includes acknowledging these past sins and distorted view of the gospel. As a congregation, we have committed to understanding and lamenting the past while striving to change the future. To turn this principle into action, the membership recently made the Racial Justice and Inclusion Team a permanent part of the church structure. The team organizes events to bring nationally recognized speakers to Columbia. They traveled on a civil rights pilgrimage with Second Baptist Church, our predominantly African-American sister church.

As First Baptist Columbia enters its third century, the church continues to express its voice as a progressive, engaged, and inclusive congregation. Members value education and study that are spiritually maturing, challenge our perceptions, and deepen our faith. First Baptist Columbia is committed to continued support of music enrichment, deepening communal engagement through local ministries, and openly sharing our values.



First Baptist Columbia holds a proud history of women in leadership. The first record of women taking charge of church affairs occurred in 1876, with the first woman elected to the Board of Trustees in 1912. In 1977, the church began to ordain women for ministry, and it has benefited from the ministry of three female pastors since. Additionally, while First Baptist Columbia officially went through the process of becoming an affirming church in 2014, it has long been a place where members of the LGBTQIA+ community have been welcome both as members and as a part of church leadership.

Rev. Caleb Cooke - Pastoral Resident



Caleb, a native of Mount Airy, North Carolina, began a pastoral residency at First Baptist Columbia in August 2023 and was ordained by the church in March 2024. Caleb's call to ministry is rooted in the sure and present hope of Christ's resurrection. He believes that hope is central to the Christian faith and is committed to fostering hope in the Church. Noah works as a talent recruiter and holds a bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies from the University of Missouri with concentrations in psychology, sociology and music. As a staff liaison for the host team, Brenda works closely with church groups and teams, and facilitating meetings and events. She also coordinates and hosts yearly

church-wide events, oversees all outside groups that rent our facilities, and manages community services that the church hosts. In addition, she handles website maintenance, weekly updates, and oversees our YouTube channel.

In addition to the positions listed above, First Baptist Columbia employs both a custodian and an administrative assistant.

Organization & Governance



Church Council

The council coordinates the church's programs and plans in such a way as to promote unity, completeness and purposefulness within the congregation. This group meets as needed, but no less than once a quarter. The council is led by a church moderator, elected by the congregation to serve a two-year term. Membership consists of coordinators from seven ministry teams, the church clerk, treasurer and three at-large members elected annually from the congregation. Church pastors serve as ex-officio members.

There are seven ministry teams, each with a coordinator that serves a two-year term. Coordinators are eligible for re-election if so selected by the Nominating Committee and elected by the church.

- Congregational Care (Loving) Team extends love and care to the entire congregation through interaction and Christian fellowship. The Diaconate provides visits and special care for those unable to attend in-person worship and events.
- Teaching Team coordinates most forms of Christian education directed to the congregation and chosen audiences beyond the congregation.
- Worship Team provides direction for use of worship spaces, enhances the worship experience and encourages member participation and ways to share their gifts in worship.

- Missions (Serving) Team leads the congregation in mission education and ministry both locally and beyond. The team meets monthly to discuss and make recommendations on how to best allocate First Baptist Columbia's resources of time, talent and financial support to ministry partners at the local, national and global level.
- **Telling Team** uses print, radio, website and social media to equip and encourage the congregation to invite and welcome guests to worship and other informing events sponsored by the church.
- Racial Justice and Inclusion Team provides studies and opportunities for the congregation to recognize and better understand the ways white privilege has caused harm and to build relationships that cross the racial divide and achieve justice and inclusion of all marginalized people in our church and in the broader community.
- Administrative Team seeks to ensure adequate staffing, care and distribution of funds, plans for and maintains physical plant resources and keeps proper congregational records.



Ministries

Worship Services

Each Sunday, First Baptist Columbia offers well-planned, spiritually thoughtful worship experiences guided by scripture and including congregational participation and excellent music. Most Sundays, two opportunities are available, but on special Sundays, a single blended worship or a "brunch worship" are offered. Visual enhancements enrich the worship experience.

- Awakening worship meets at 9:15 a.m. in the Fellowship Hall. Music is led by a praise and worship band with lead, bass and acoustic guitars, drums, saxophone and piano. Vocalists lead music and encourage participation.
- Traditional worship meets at 11:15 a.m. in the Sanctuary. The Chancel Choir provides an anthem. Musical support also is offered by pipe organ, piano, handbells and occasionally other instruments.

Small Groups and Sunday School – These groups meet at 10:15 a.m. in the Education Building and provide Bible study, discussion and fellowship.





Children, Youth, College

Children

First Kids engages youngsters from kindergarten through fifth grade in worship and activities that help form their faith and develop a nurturing connection to the church family. Our children collect the offering,

pray, share their stories, light Advent candles and even lead in worship. They enjoy a variety of activities in each season such as a family pancake party, Easter egg hunts, a Pentecost party, parents' night out at a local family entertainment center, vacation Bible school for the entire family, and participation in churchwide family events, including a summer pool party, the Fall Kickoff and Fall Fun Fest. Enthusiastic volunteers from among the adult and youth membership help make First Kids a robust, growing ministry of First Baptist Columbia.

Youth

For more than a century, First Baptist Columbia has been known for its strong tradition of student ministry, backed by a dedicated and active advisory group of parents and volunteers. Our youth are energetic,

> contributing church members, participating in fellowship, learning, worship and service projects. They grow in faith and knowledge through Sunday morning small-group study and Wednesday evening gatherings. In recent years, the highlight has been a summer trip to Unidiversity Camp in Maryville, Tennessee, where they examine inspiring spiritual themes while enjoying nature, float trips and other fun recreation in the Smoky Mountains. Students enthusiastically take on leadership roles in church and community service projects and in activities such as making treats for homebound members, leading worship, cooking pancakes for the First Kids' Lenten kickoff, hiding

Easter eggs, helping conduct the summer family camp, and serving those in need at First Baptist Columbia's Extra Mile House and Columbia's City of Refuge. Fellowship outings find the youth representing the church in local parades, ice skating, bowling, attending concerts, enjoying Trunk or Treat, and the new sixth-graders spending a day at Worlds of Fun at the end of the summer. The ministry is poised for growth in the coming years as we nurture more young people in their faith and service to God and community.

College and Young Adults

Being located in a city with two colleges and a state university, First Baptist Columbia welcomes new students each year from across Missouri, the nation and from other countries. Young adults are encouraged to be full participants in the life of the church. They have opportunities to fellowship and to get to know each other better through weekly gatherings, shared meals, and activities such as board game café night and book discussions. A number of college students and young adults also serve in leadership roles, including for the children's ministry and as scholarship musicians. To reach out to more young people, First Baptist Columbia recently joined seven other local churches to form TIDES, an ecumenical, LGBTQIA+ campus ministry that in the past year has offered "ashes to go" on the Mizzou campus, a weekly Lenten vespers service, an outdoor Easter service at sunset and a fall retreat.

Music

First Baptist Columbia has an array of musical opportunities for the congregation stemming from our belief in the importance of music in the praise and worship of God.



- Chancel Choir ranges in age from college students to retirees and practices and sings during the traditional worship service.
- **Chancel Bells** welcomes anyone, experienced or novice, and plays in worship several times a month.
- The **Praise Band**, featuring vocals accompanied by electric/acoustic/bass guitars, keyboard, electric drums, plays a variety of contemporary worship style music for the 9:15 a.m. Awakening service.
- **First Friends** musicians, made up of K through 5th graders, have the opportunity to learn music at our summer family camp and sing at Sunday's worship service. They also learn and perform special music each year during our church Christmas dinner.
- Scholarship musicians serve as integral parts of our worship teams. These paid positions are held by college students, many of whom are seeking degrees in music. They contribute to First Baptist Columbia's musical offerings as section leaders in our Chancel Choir and provide musical leadership for our praise band.





Ministries (continued)

Pastoral Residency

Acknowledging the high rate of "burnout" in ministry and lack of opportunities for women and non-binary seminary graduates to gain experience as pastors, First Baptist Columbia provides a pastoral residency ministry of two to three years. Each resident fellow is immersed in a comprehensive curriculum built on preaching, worship, pastoral care, self-care, church leadership, management and administrative tasks, teams and councils, missions and benevolence, and affinity-focused ministries. Brittany McDonald Null, current Pastor of Families and Spiritual Formation, was our first pastoral resident. Following the pandemic, the congregation reaffirmed our mission to restart the residency ministry. Caleb Cooke, our current resident, started with the church in August 2023 and was ordained in March 2024. Funding from the Eula Mae and John Baugh Foundation matches First Baptist Columbia's financial support for this ministry.

Extra Mile House

For the past four years, First Baptist Columbia has partnered with Love Columbia through sponsorship of an Extra Mile House, providing transitional housing for families experiencing homelessness or housing instability. In addition to covering costs of maintaining the property, church members clean, repair and furnish the home during transition times between families, while our youth group prepares meals to welcome families on move-in day.

Music Partnerships

The Odyssey Chamber Music Series, which premiered in 2004 as an outreach of First Baptist Columbia, offers six to seven concerts a year focusing on classical chamber music with an emphasis on highlighting different styles and genres. The series carries the mission of glorifying God while developing community through the arts. In addition to the Odyssey Series, First Baptist Columbia has a strong tradition of opening its sanctuary to music programs and ensembles from across the community for both rehearsals and concerts, including school groups, community ensembles and individual recitals.

The Plowman Chamber Music Competition and Festival promotes chamber music among young, non-professional musicians, giving them a chance to perform and win cash awards. It is presented by First Baptist Columbia, the University of Missouri, Missouri Symphony and Odyssey Chamber Music Series. First Baptist Columbia also hosts the competition weekend.

Sheppard Lecture Series

The Sheppard Lecture Series Fund, established in honor of former Pastor Dr. Lee Sheppard, has provided support to invite nationally known speakers to our church and community for many years. Recent speakers include:

- Robert P. Jones, author of White Too Long: The Legacy of White Supremacy in American Christianity
- Diana Butler Bass, author on contemporary spirituality
- Jemar Tisby, author of How to Fight Racism: Courageous Christianity and the Journey Toward Racial Justice
- *The Many*, an intentionally diverse musical group that sings about peace, justice and a world where all belong

Community Participation

First Baptist Columbia congregants participate in several annual community events, including:

Encourager Church

First Baptist Columbia is a Cooperative Baptist Fellowship "encourager church" for missionaries Keith Holmes and Mary VanRheenen. For more than 25 years, the couple has coordinated outreach to Romani people throughout Europe, translating the *Good News* into different Romany dialects from their base in the Netherlands.

In May 2023, members of the mission team went to the Netherlands to see firsthand their ongoing work. In addition, through Keith and Mary's connections to a Romani church in Moldova, First Baptist Columbia and Cooperative Baptist Fellowship were able to send financial assistance for Ukrainian refugees.

Community Partners



First Baptist Columbia supports various local organizations and ministry partners with budgeted funds and/or volunteer assistance.

- Voluntary Action Center is a local nonprofit that responds to the immediate basic needs of the individuals and families within our community. The center currently directs the Opportunity Campus, a multiagency effort that will build a 24/7, 125-bed shelter with community resource center and medical clinic for Columbia's unhoused population.
- City of Refuge is a local nonprofit that serves Columbia's refugee population to fulfill basic needs, assist with education and language skills, and facilitate professional development. In 2023, more than 50 First Baptist Columbia volunteers worked at City of Refuge as part of their ForColumbia city-wide day of service.
- Food Bank for Central & Northeast Missouri
 directs a regional disaster and hunger relief network
 that acquires and distributes millions of pounds
 of food annually to partner agencies across a
 32-county area.
- Room at the Inn COMO coordinates sites and volunteers to shelter Columbia's unhoused population, especially in the winter months. In addition to financial support and volunteering, the church's Fellowship Hall has been utilized as a location for overnight shelter and food distribution during cold months. The organization is also partnering to build the Opportunity Campus.

- Stonebridge House is a new community partnership, founded by a First Baptist Columbia member, that provides housing and guidance for women transitioning from incarceration back to community living. Funding from First Baptist Columbia covers visits with a licensed therapist specializing in trauma for residents, in accordance with the motto of "Prison is traumatic therapy helps."
- ForColumbia celebrated its 10-year anniversary to bring Christians together to share God's love by serving our community side by side. Volunteers come together to work on a city-wide annual "day of service" event that addresses needs in our community. First Baptist Columbia leads several projects each year through volunteer and financial support.







First Baptist Church is located on 2.9 acres of property on the southwest corner of the intersection of Waugh Street and Broadway in Columbia, Missouri. The property is beautifully landscaped and enjoys an expansive canopy of majestic mature trees. The facility is one large structure containing four areas:

- Sanctuary Built in 1957, this large vaulted space features seating for 354 persons, a balcony, a baptistry and a 1477-pipe organ. The church's iconic spire sits over the portico. In addition to holding Traditional worship, the Sanctuary also hosts other civic events and chamber music concerts series.
- Education Building This four-story building houses a fellowship hall, which is also serves as the setting for contemporary Awakenings worship as well as gathering space. Kitchen space adjoins the fellowship hall. Classrooms/conference rooms, church office space, elementary and youth rooms, and gymnasium are found on the floors above..
- *Elevator Tower Building* Built in 1997, this three-story structure sits adjoining the Education Building and provides elevator access and additional classroom space.
- Center Connecting Building This small one-story structure connects the Sanctuary with the Elevator Tower and Education Building complex. It currently holds the children's preschool room and additional classroom space.

Significant efforts have been made in the past five years to upgrade and beautify internal and external spaces and make them more functional. These include VMix webcasting system for both services, redesigned Zoom-equipped conference rooms, new north patio entrance to the Sanctuary, and lawn and landscaping improvements.

Green lawn space on the west side of the sanctuary is beautiful and allows for on-the-lawn worship, outdoor picnics, and recreational opportunities for the congregation. The green space is framed by the architectural elements of the sanctuary and the historical Educational Building, presenting a beautiful landscape in the downtown district on the main street of Broadway.

The aging infrastructure and evolving congregational expectations regarding modern building dynamics have prompted the membership to actively pursue renovation of the church. Although this desire has been present for decades, a renewed interest leading up to our 200th anniversary led to consultation with an architectural firm to provide ideas for future possibilities.

Visioning & Self-Study



In preparation for calling a new pastor, First Baptist Columbia completed an in-depth self-study. The information below captures the key results of the process.

We Seek Church for:

- 1. Worshipping God
- 2. Being with and supporting friends
- 3. Hearing inspirational sermons
- 4. Progressive theological convictions and social justice

Goals

Our congregation sees itself as a strong voice for progressive Christianity, seeking to mirror Christ's ministry of acceptance, and striving to be a place of healing and reconciliation for individuals who have faced religious trauma.

- Strengthening authentic community within the congregation – Maintain two distinct worship services while coming together more often for combined worship. Explore opportunities for additional small groups, fellowship and other avenues for building community.
- Increasing inclusivity and accessibility in First Baptist Columbia ministries and facilities Expand opportunities for inclusion education and experiences, understanding that it takes intentionality to be a diverse community. Explore what it would take to address the accessibility issue in the sanctuary.
- Enriching ministry to children, youth and their families – Form ad hoc Children's Ministry Task Force to perform needs assessment, review best practices and explore ways to build capacity. Increase accessibility for children who are differently abled.
- Sustaining the Pastoral Residency Ministry –
 Continue to manage program for long-term success.

- Deepening community engagement in Columbia

 Strengthen our engagement, informed by our understanding of how we are called to be God's hands and feet through social justice efforts, ecumenical endeavors and continued involvement in Room at the Inn, ForColumbia and Voluntary Action Center.
- Expanding external communication Increase our social media presence and advertising to make our progressive voice known in the community. Look for opportunities to use our green space. Provide additional opportunities for the church to learn how to invite others to join us.

Top Concerns

- Attendance Desire for more members and younger families, recognize some separation between two services.
- Building and Facilities Managing aging infrastructure, improving accessibility, planning and executing renovations for increase utility.
- Loss of Pastors Desire to maintain current theology and academic style, fill the roles of two pastors leaving simultaneously (married couple), and concern for overburdening clergy and staff during the interim.

Pastoral Priorities

When choosing among 15 categories, our congregation ranked preaching, leadership, and pastoral care as top priorities.

- Preaching Be transformative, theologically progressive, scripture-based. Use themes in preaching series. Be authentic, practical, kind, loving, positive and engaging.
- Leadership Work with other pastors as a team, delegate, lead by example, and have overarching vision. Frequently check in with lay leaders, be relational, be consistent with our history and values, be intensely involved with the community. Be well organized and planned. Bridge both services, know congregation, and teach classes.
- *Pastoral Care* Be available for church members in need. Refer when necessary. Equip church members to help.
