Selections from 1 Samuel 25

There was a man in Maon who was very rich. He was shearing his sheep in Carmel. Now the name of the man was Nabal, and the name of his wife was Abigail. The woman was clever and beautiful, but the man was surly and mean; he was a Calebite. David heard that Nabal was shearing his sheep. So David sent ten young men, and David said, "Go to Nabal and greet him in my name. Thus you shall salute him, 'Peace be to you, and peace be to your house, and peace be to all that you have. Your shepherds have been with us, and we did them no harm. Therefore let my young men find favor in your sight, for we have come on a feast day. Please give whatever you have at hand to your servants and to your son David.'"

When David's young men came, they said all this to Nabal. But Nabal answered David's servants, "Who is David? Who is the son of Jesse? Shall I take my bread and my water and give it to men who come from I do not know where?" So David's young men turned away and came back and told him all this. David said to his men, "Every man strap on his sword!" And every one of them strapped on his sword, including David. But one of the young men told Abigail, Nabal's wife, "David sent messengers out and Nabal shouted insults at them. Yet the men were very good to us. Now, therefore, know this and consider what you should do, for evil has been decided against our master and against all his house; he is so ill-natured that no one can speak to him." Then Abigail hurried and took two hundred loaves, two skins of wine, five sheep ready dressed, five measures of parched grain, one hundred clusters of raisins, and two hundred cakes of figs. She loaded them on donkeys and said to her young men, "Go on ahead of me; I am coming after you." But she did not tell her husband Nabal.

When Abigail saw David, she fell before David on her face, bowing to the ground. She said "My lord, do not take seriously this ill-natured fellow. I, your servant, did not see the young men of my lord, whom you sent. Now then, my lord, as the Lord lives and as you yourself live, since the Lord has restrained you from bloodguilt and from taking vengeance with your own hand, please forgive the trespass of your servant."
