Register Now For Unidiversity Camp



Ash Wednesday March 5 @ 6:00 pm

Lent invites us to an intentional practice of our faith, but often our best intentions are lost before we put them into action.

On this first evening of our new Lenten series, "Everything [in] Between," we will ponder together how we sit between intention and action in our faith. We will affirm our desire to repent, to follow God, and to be renewed. Join us at 6pm as we worship and receive the ashes. The Ash Wednesday service is in-person only, and childcare will be available.

Lenten Worship Series: Everything In Between

This year, we're letting the Gospel of Luke guide us through Lent. Beginning with Jesus setting his face toward Jerusalem (Luke 9:51), this worship series designed by A Sanctified Art, flows through several familiar stories—the Good Samaritan, Mary and Martha, the fruitless fig tree, the Lost Sheep, Zacchaeus, and more. Many of these stories are well-known in both sacred and secular imagination and hold significance in pop culture, church history, politics, and everything in between.

The theme, "Everything In Between," invites us to navigate the polarities in our lives with more faith, intention, and openness to be transformed. Each weekly sub-theme explores two supposed binaries, like "faith & works" or "rest & growth," or "grief &

hope." We often consider these ideas to be opposing. However, as we explore these concepts within the scriptures, we find nuance and complexity. We find that these dichotomies are false. We might begin to see a full spectrum instead of black and white. We might find that God is present in between.



Lenten Devotional Book



Racial Justice & Inclusion Team Book Discussion The Spirit of Justice: True Stories of Faith, Race and Resistance March 31 at 6pm in the Parlor

First Baptist Church's Racial Justice & Inclusion Team invites you to participate in an intergenerational discussion of Jemar Tisby's newest book, *The Spirit of Justice* and its companion books *I am the Spirit of Justice* (youth version) and *Stories of the Spirit of Justice* (picture book). In these books, Dr. Tisby uncovers unsung heroes who have struggled for racial justice and whose stories have inspired him in his work to enlighten and embolden people of faith to work for racial justice. It is his hope to inspire and embolden readers to step out in similar ways as we learn about these historic heroes.

The book discussion will take place in one evening but in two parts. The first hour of discussion will be for families/intergenerational with a snack break following. The second hour of discussion will be for those who wish to dive more deeply and to consider individual and collective response.
