- Icebreaker -

If you could go back in time and witness any **one** historical event, what would it be and why?

- What are some things you see in yourself which reveal your own tendency towards an inward focus? Read <u>Mark 2:16-17</u> & <u>Luke 19:10</u> as a reminder of Jesus' call to all His followers.
- 2. We sometimes think we're outward-focused, only to find that we're selectively outward-focused. God scattered the church to reach into new places. (<u>Acts 6:7</u>, <u>11:19-21</u>) When you look at who you interact with—is it a wide spectrum of people, or more narrow, and what would increase your reach?
- **3.** Read <u>Acts 2:36-41</u>, <u>16:13-15</u>. How might these interactions have gone differently if Peter and Paul were inward-focused, or just ignored the opportunity...the divine appointment?
- 4. Acts <u>Acts 26:27-29</u>, <u>Philippians 1:12-14</u>, <u>2 Corinthians 5:20</u>, and <u>Ephesians 2:11-13</u> illustrate Pastor Tom's point that even in hard times and circumstances, being outward-focused brings perspective, joy and gratitude. Can you see places in your life where an outward focus would bring a new outlook?
- **5.** Let's finish with taking some time to talk about Pastor Tom's closing questions: "So are you more inward-focused, or are you more outward-focused? Will you sincerely ask God to help you to be more like Him...?" (Ephesians 5:1-2, Acts 1:8)

But despite how clear the mission and priority of Jesus is, and despite the reality that most Bible-believing churches <u>affirm</u> that Jesus wants them to be outward-focused and reach lost people; the fact is, there's a cognitive dissonance in many/most churches and individuals when we recognize that what we say we believe and how we act are at least <u>inconsistent</u>, and at worst, contradictory.

Today I want us to <u>compare</u> and contrast how being inward-focused and outward-focused affects us.

. When We're <u>Inward</u>-Focused...

Even after Jesus was raised from the dead, His disciples were focused on <u>themselves</u> (note <u>Acts 1:4-6</u>, <u>8</u>).

After a long time of being outward-focused, the Church in Jerusalem had an internal conflict/problem that started to get them off-mission (note <u>Acts</u> <u>6:1</u>).

Fortunately, the apostles stayed outward-focused with their <u>solution</u> (note <u>Acts 6:2-4</u>).

2 of these 7 ("deacons") were <u>Stephen</u> (note <u>Acts 6:8</u>) and Phillip (the *Evangelist*). Note <u>Acts 8:4-7</u>, <u>26-39</u>

The Jerusalem Church was reaching people (note <u>Acts 6:7</u>), but their focus was <u>narrow</u>.

They were only interested in reaching people <u>like them</u> who lived near them. Note <u>Acts 1:8</u> When we're not as outward-focused as Jesus wants us to be, at best we will only interact with people who look, talk, think, and <u>vote</u> like us.

- We get to be an <u>ambassador</u> of the Creator of the universe and Savior of the world...
- And when we share our story with others and invite people to come and sit with us, it reminds us of how much we have to be <u>grateful</u> for (note <u>Ephesians 2:12</u> and <u>1 Timothy 1:12-17</u>).
