PASTORAL UPDATE

Advent is my favorite church season. For all the obvious reasons—wonderful memories with family, festive decorations, familiar music, endless sources of sugar, and ideally lots and lots of snow. But beyond the customs and traditions, Advent is my favorite season because it's marked with waiting and hoping. I don't always feel like repenting when Lent comes around in the spring. I don't always feel on fire when Pentecost happens in May. Ordinary time (all summer and fall) often feels more frenetic than a consistent rhythm. But every year when Advent arrives, I am filled with yearning for something, whether that's for life to calm down, for the world to be fairer, or for hope to be more tangible.

Since the election, I have not felt overly filled with hope and peace, joy and love. These are my prayers for sure, but they exist surrounded by bubbles of fear and worry. I have heard the stories and seen the tears from those whom our national rhetoric is not just hypothetical but has real implications for their everyday lives. I worry for those who have experienced sexual assault, and the narrative they hear that minimizes their pain. I worry for those who are immigrants, who have loving families and jobs and homes, and the narrative they hear that they are to blame for any of our difficulties and should be banished to another place. I worry for those who are people of color who are more at risk for hate crimes and racial slurs. I worry for those who are GLBTQ, who may not have access to appropriate medical care. I worry for those who are pregnant who do not have a choice over how to care for their own wellbeing. I worry for all of us, as barriers keep emerging to keep us from knowing each other and the growing division that tricks us into thinking we are enemies with our political opponents.

I hold all of these voices and fears in one hand, and in the other I hold onto the promises of the prophets who spoke to their own population of weary, worried people: a light shines in the darkness, God lives among us, the ordinary becomes extraordinary. I have come to realize that Advent is less about a certain feeling I may have, and more about a proclamation: The Prince of Peace is coming.

As people of faith, we have a choice for how we want to engage this new season, this new year. Will we choose the stories of peace and hope? Will we work for joy and love? I know we will. I've seen it week after week, in each of you and how you show up in the world. You are what fills me with hope when the news is too much to bear or the fear creeps in. Keep shining your light and shedding your love in the ordinary, mundane parts of your lives. You are the messengers of Advent for a world in pain.





OUR COMMUNITY

Environmental Justice Team

In 2025, the Environmental Justice Team's focus will be on local efforts to protect the environment. We are planning an electronics recycling drive and a plastic-free challenge and considering holding a church social justice summit.

We plan to pull together a team for the Hennepin County Plastic-Free Challenge. This fully online event teaches participants ways to reduce the use of plastic, which cuts waste and protects water, wildlife, and our health, as well as that of future generations. It takes place in February, with registration beginning in January. Watch the church bulletin and Thursday email for details and join us for this fun and educational challenge.

The electronics drive involves collecting old computers, laptops, network equipment, cell phones, TVs, and household appliances and sending them for recycling. We are planning the drive for this spring; details and dates to be announced. In the meantime, please don't put any items that might qualify in your trash.

The Environmental Justice Team has been a part of Excelsior Methodist's Social Justice Ministries since 2017. The ministries were the driving force behind the church installing the rooftop solar panels that now produce 100 percent of our building's electricity, and for instituting the organic waste collection that prevents that garbage from generating global-warming methane gas in local landfills.

Our subcommittee believes it is time for the church to hold a social justice summit to discuss the direction of the social justice ministries and their role in the church. We will be talking with the other members of the Social Justice Team and Pastor Brooke to set up this summit. More information to come.

Anti-Racism September Movie Night

You can't "discover" land that is already occupied, but growing up, most of us were taught that Columbus discovered American in 1492. The documentary, *The Doctrine of Discovery*, watched by nearly 50 EUMC members and friends during two screenings in October, depicts a more accurate account of the first encounters between Europeans and Indigenous people. It was uncomfortable, unsettling and disturbing to watch.

Most of us were unaware that in the 15th century, Europeans landing anywhere not inhabited by Christians. They believed that they had a Biblical right to the land, the people and the resources they found. The explorers were encouraged and supported by the Catholic church in a series of edicts signed by popes (called papal bulls) that came to be called the Doctrine of Discovery.



To this day, the doctrine serves as a foundation of the political and legal system of the United States. According to John Marshall in an 1823 land dispute before the Supreme Court, the United States, upon winning its independence in 1776, became a successor nation to the right of discovery and acquired the power of dominion from Great Britain. He wrote that upon discovery, Indigenous people had lost their rights to complete sovereignty as independent nations, and only retained a right of "occupancy" in their lands. It was cited in a Supreme Court case as recently as 2005.

In her introduction to the film, Pastor Brooke reminded us that there are times we can't do anything about the history or the heartache we encounter, but we can be present in the pain and loss. She invited us to consider ourselves witnesses to this history, that our task that night was to simply be present and hear the story.

Sometimes we wonder if seeing a movie, attending a play or reading a book makes any difference at all. Watching this movie forced us to view our history in a new way, it fundamentally shifted our worldview. That's how change begins--one person, one group, one partnership at a time. As Pastor Brooke reminded us in her recent sermon series, stories matter. Our presence matters.

Doctrine of Discovery 1452

"...invade, search out, capture, vanquish, and subdue Saracens and pagans whatsoever, and other enemies of Christ wheresoever placed, and the kingdoms, dukedoms, principalities, dominions, possessions, and all movable and immovable goods whatsoever held and possessed by them and to reduce their persons to perpetual slavery, and to apply and appropriate to himself and his successors the kingdoms, dukedoms, counties, principalities, dominions, possessions, and goods and to convert them to his and their use and profit."

FINANCE TEAM REPORT

2024 Budget Update:

Through the first 10 months of the year, we have received contributions of slightly more than \$400,000. This puts us ahead of the pace we need to achieve our budgeted contribution amount of \$455,000 and we expect to surpass that budgeted amount in the remaining two months of the year. Our staff, congregation, and leadership team have done an excellent job with financial prudence, keeping expenses below budget by approximately \$45,000. Most of this budget underrun is driven by lower building improvement and maintenance costs, along with a timing gap in filling our music director opening.

Stewardship Update:

Thank you to everyone who gives generously to support this church. During the year we have seen increased giving and the momentum is carrying into 2025. 2025 estimates of giving cards have been steadily rolling in and we are encouraged to see many of you commit to growing your operating giving in the coming year. This is progressing us towards our goal of increasing giving to support an annual \$600,000 operating budget. A more specific update will be available soon.

Capital Campaign Update:

As we approach the end of this year, we also mark the conclusion of the 3-year giving period (22-24) for the capital campaign that financed our recent renovations. What a tremendous success, with over \$1.6 Million in donations from 90+ individuals and families. Any additional donations will help continue reducing the remaining ~300K balance on the line of credit.
