Rector's Message

All Creatures of Our God and King

One of the true joys of this summer past has been the doubling of the average Sunday attendance of our 8 AM outdoor service. After a slow beginning due to "Junuary" weather, our usher Adam Dread had the creative idea to more intentionally invite children and pets to that Memorial Garden Eucharist. He shared his reasoning with *Inquirer & Mirror* reporter Sarah Roberts that the presence of our critters would more fully engage the children and keep them off their electronic devices. And he was absolutely right. Sarah wrote a front-page article about it all and word quickly spread. The rest is history.

Over my nearly 30 years of ordained ministry, many have expressed their concern about the lack of children participating in church. This is true across most faith traditions, and it bodes ill for the wellbeing of our communities and society. So, as a

parish, we first pray for our children; we provide snacks for school and summer programs. We serve them afterschool with Ready, Set, Read, and with our upcoming Toy Library. Like Adam, we come up with creative ideas. We plant the seeds, others water, and we trust that God will give the growth.

Our summer experience is reminiscent of St. Paul's popular yearly Blessing of the Animals, this year on October 5, when we and our critters worshiped together. Then we sang William Draper's paraphrase of the words of St. Francis of Assisi:

"All creatures of Our God and King, lift up your voices and with us sing Alleluia, Alleluia! Let all things their Creator bless, and worship God with humbleness, O praise God, Alleluia!"

We are encouraged by all the positive feedback and offers of assistance this year. Sunday attendance this summer was robust, especially in the garden where it was occasionally SRO! Both long-time and new members of the parish are getting engaged like never before and chipping in where help is needed. PERSPECTIVES

I have had the privilege of serving on the vestries of two thriving Episcopal churches: my church at home and at St. Paul's. What I have learned is that the enjoyment and satisfaction of the experience depends upon the leadership of the rector and the wardens.


At the Church of St. Michael & St. George in Clayton, MO, I was on the Vestry for 10 years. The church is fortunate to have a rector who has been highly successful. He's been with us for 25 years. In his first month he received an anonymous letter and had it published on the front page of the church's weekly newsletter. It set the tone. Most of my time on the Vestry was smooth sailing. The group was corporate, and I didn't have much to say. But once at a vestry retreat, when we were discussing the relationship between the church and its school, I let loose for five minutes. Everyone listened politely, most nodded in agreement, and then we went on to the next thing.

At St. Paul's it has been different. Although I'm an offisland representative, I've been welcomed warmly. I came aboard when Bob Felch and Libby Tracey were the wardens and Martin McKerrow was the treasurer. Bob's steady hand and his remarkable ability to pack the most meaning into the fewest words were a wonder to behold. Libby was the Mr. Rogers of the group. She always looked on the bright side and had a kind word for everyone. The ultimate nurturer, she should have been in charge of faculty morale at a school. Martin reminded me of the mathematician in The Little Prince who had charts and diagrams for every conceivable inflow and outflow. Once I got the hang of it, Martin's charts were very helpful, and he was masterful in enlightening us about the details of the church's finances. He always said it took him a few hours a week, but everyone knew his devotion to duty was a full-time avocation. Patsy Wright was the sprightly presence behind the church's commitment to increased communication, and Patsy and Peter Barnes were the leaders of a stewardship campaign that kept increasing its goal every year. AI will never rival the notes our clerk, Peter Greenhalgh takes at our meetings. In all of this and of it and through it is Fr. Max, working closely with his wardens, orchestrating the whole thing. It was a wonder to behold. I hoped it would never end. But, of course, it did. Bob, Libby, and Martin rotated off the vestry. I was broken-hearted.

Many organizations are weak in the area of succession planning, but not St. Paul's. Little did I know that behind the scenes a new cast of characters was in the wings. Lucy Leske had struck me as wise and sensible. She ran the audit committee with a tight fist, and claimed it was the most enjoyable meeting of the year! I volunteered, and she was right. When Lucy emerged as one of the new wardens, I was impressed. Liz Bristow, one of the newer members who had teamed up with Dorothy Baker to lead the outreach effort, became the other warden. Liz brought new energy and insight to the position, so I was hopeful. Over the years, Kirk Baker had worked closely with Martin on the finances and investments, and he was able to ease into the treasurer's chair. I liked Kirk, and we have a St. Louis connection. This new group had promise.

At the 2025 annual meeting, the baton was passed, and I can report that it has been highly successful. What has been heartening is to see that each of these new leaders does it in her or his own way. It's different, but I love it. Lucy gets right to the point, and she listens carefully. Liz is a passionate advocate for outreach, as is her partner, Dorothy. They are the gold dust twins. We get a detailed report on outreach every three months. Kirk has grown into his role, and his presentations give us the same sense of the church's financial position as did Martin's charts and diagrams. Patsy and Peter are upping the mark for stewardship, and Patsy is still on our case to make Tidings deadlines. Ruthie Klinck is chairing the Christmas Market, and Steve Paradis is our campus improvement mogul. There are projects galore afoot, and how lucky we are to have Steve on our team. Colby Crenshaw and Cece Fowler are our Texas stars "who are big and bright." The venerable Lou Gennaro adds institutional history to our discussions. And Toby Broadus got us so interested in the bylaws it was as if we were reading excerpts from an Elin Hilderbrand novel. Wise Jay Riggs shares her thoughts on the church's needs and values, and Sheri Perelman's calm demeanor fosters a sense of peace and calm within the Vestry. Peter Greenhalgh continues to take assiduous notes of the proceedings.

Did anyone ever tell me that being on a Vestry could be fun? It sure is at St. Paul's, but the Vestry is also a cohesive, effective group that is working each day to fulfill the mission of the church, "to make the love of God more widely known."

To date, we have received 97 pledges totaling \$3.1 million. For a church with 350 active members, this represents more than a quarter of our parishioners—a remarkable showing of generosity and of belief in the future of St. Paul's.

Along with grants from the island's Community Preservation Committee, we have used campaign proceeds so far to compete the restoration of our bell tower, which was at structural risk; to upgrade our front entrance, to make it safer and more accessible, and to make modest but needed renovations to our Parish House, including better office space for our staff.

We are now engaged in the final phase of our renovation work, the remodeling of Gardner Hall with additional upgrades throughout the church building:

- A sprinkler system, to protect our parishioners and our historic structure, especially the sacred space on the first floor and the priceless Tiffany stainedglass windows that adorn it.
- Cooling and heating systems to make our members, friends and visitors more comfortable in our building, upstairs and down, throughout the year.
- A new electrical system to replace the existing 50-year-old one, to power these upgrades.
- New flooring, walls, ceilings and bathrooms in Gardner Hall, which has not been renovated since its excavation in the 1970s.



JH: In my dual roles, both nursing and church sexton responsibilities focus on wellbeing. In my role as a nurse,






I provide essential physical care to others. In my role as sexton, I take pride in nurturing our church's physical campus. Both provide community service while promoting special awareness.



The Nantucket Toy Library is a new ministry of St. Paul's Church, created to nurture play and belonging for island children and their families. Launching with a soft opening in October 2025 and a grand opening in January 2026, the library offers a welcoming indoor play space, access to an enclosed playground, and the opportunity to borrow toys for home play. Staffed entirely by Safe Church-certified volunteers, and supported by St. Paul's, as well as by grants and community generosity, the Toy Library invites families, especially those with children ages 0-5, to laugh, play, learn and share together. As we launch this new ministry, we welcome those who would like to be involved.



Motto: What will you play with today? Mission: To celebrate and nurture play and to offer a place of belonging for children. Who: A ministry of St. Paul's Church, open to all island families, especially children ages 0–5. Staffed entirely by trained volunteers, each Safe Church certified and CORIchecked.

What: A toy-lending library and indoor play space connected to our enclosed playground. Families may borrow one or two toys for two weeks.

When: Tuesdays and Fridays, 9am–12pm, plus alternating Saturdays. Soft launch: October 2025. Grand opening: January 2026. Where: The newly created indoor play space in St. Paul's Parish House and our enclosed playground.




Thanks to the continued


