# **SERMON**NOTES

Sunday, Dec 3, 2023 Written by Rev. Dr. Alf Halvorson

## Joy on the Journey • Philippians 3:12-4:1 (NRSV)

This is the ninth in our series on Paul's Letter to the Church in Phillipi and, with this being the first Sunday in Advent 2023, we wait and hope, prepare and anticipate the Coming of Christ. We rehearse His First Coming to be ready for His Second Coming. And Paul suggests that, while we live in this "in-between liminal space and time of waiting," there is work to be done internally and externally for the Kingdom breaking in among us. But ultimately, "our citizenship is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ," as Phil. 3:20 exclaims. The Stoics lived in fear of the future, but Paul suggests that Christians live from the future (and thus have joy and hope.)

- 1. What are your traditions in your family regarding Advent and Christmas?
- 2. For Paul, a supreme goal for the Christian is "to know Christ" and "to share" in His death and resurrection. See Phil. 3:8, 10, 12, 14, 17-20. What does that mean for you? How do you know Christ? Does reading Scripture, or prayer, or worship, or service play a role in your knowing? And where is Christ still a mystery to you? I quoted Augustine last week: "You stand before God as if you were Christ, because Christ stood before God as if He were you." Does that help explain this "know Christ" idea at all? In what way is it helpful?
- 3. In verses 13-14, we are challenged to "forget what lies behind in the past and press on toward the goal" in the future. What might you *leave behind* and what should you hold onto from the past? And how is "pressing forward," or our sanctification, a response of gratitude instead of works righteousness (or trying to save ourselves)?
- 4. In verses 18-19, Paul describes those who are perishing as enemies of Christ. Where is their focus and on what is their attention? Give some present-day examples of these *earthly* things. Where might the focus be re-directed, according to Paul?
- 5. I used Augustine of Hippo (354-430 AD) and his concept of "disordered loves" to get at how he believed he wasted too much of his early life on the wrong things or putting good things in the wrong place. How have you done (or do you do) that yourself?
- 6. In Phil. 3:20-4:1, what gives Paul confidence that followers and servants of Christ can stand firm in the Lord? Where might you need to "stand firm" this Advent and Christmas?
