

SERMONNOTES

New Year / New You Stories • Luke 5:33-39

This is the second in a five-week series in the new year on texts that help us understand and advance transformation in our lives. Last Sunday Paul challenged us as "chosen ones of God, holy and beloved," to *put off* certain things and *clothe ourselves* with other things/virtues. As a Christian, because Christ's Spirit is within us, we have the power to change the wardrobe of our lives for the better. This week Jesus confronts the Pharisees and scribes and tries to teach them about himself, His purpose in coming, and what is entailed in following and serving the Master.

- 1. Read Luke 5:33-39. (Often context is crucial to interpret a text. Earlier in chapter 5 of Luke's Gospel, Jesus heals the paralytic who friends lowered through a roof. Jesus had said to the man, "Friend, your sins are forgiven you." The Pharisees and scribes complained, "who can forgive sins but God?" And a little later in the chapter, Jesus calls Matthew the tax collector to "follow Me." Matthew does follow, by leaving everything, and he throws a banquet with his friends for Jesus. The Pharisees and scribes again complained saying, "why do you eat and drink with tax collectors and sinners?" Jesus answered, "Those who are well have no need for a physician, but those who are sick; I have come to call not the righteous but sinners to repentance.") How does the context contained in between the parentheses help us understand the question of the Pharisees and scribes in verse 33?
- 2. Does Jesus' answer in verses 34-35 make sense? How and why?
- 3. In verses 36-39, Jesus tells the first parable in the Gospel of Luke. Does this parable answer the Pharisees' and scribes' question too? In what way? Or, in what way does it seem like a disconnect or non-answer?
- 4. In the parable itself, what do you think Jesus has in mind regarding the new garment & new wine? And what is the old garment and the old wineskin? Why can't the combination of the two work together?
- 5. With fabrics and animal skins, the old can't become new again, can they? But how might a person be changed from an old item to a new one? What do you think Jesus is getting at here? In *Mere Christianity*, C. S. Lewis writes about Jesus coming into our hearts to transform our "houses" from the inside out. He is not just doing a little remodeling, but building a temple or mansion where He can live joyfully. How can we be open to this major renovation project?
- 6. In my sermon, I told a story from the book, *Switch*, by Dan and Chip Heath. How did that illustration and the comments around it help you think about transformation or sanctification in your life? And in this body of Christ? How might Christ's Spirit help us become more pliable, coachable, or elastic instead of rigid, fixed, unchanging, or set in our ways? How could you pray for yourself and others in your group regarding openness to Christ and His will?
