Why do you lead on the middle school mission trip to San Antonio (SATX)?

I started as a leader when my kids were in middle school. I felt it was my responsibility as a parent to support their faith journey. Now it is just what I do the first week of summer because it gives 8 more middle school kids and two

high school leaders a group a chance to go on the middle school mission trip.

What has been the most impactful thing about leading on SATX?

I feel it is very valuable for [the kids at MDPC] to see how the other half lives. They learn to serve others, they learn about unconditional love, they learn how to push a broom and swing a hammer, they learn that you don't die from sweating, and what I most hope they learn is that Jesus shows His love through the people who love Him.

Why should others lead on SATX?

Because they will get a chance to be in the game for Jesus. Whether it is helping kids learn faith and life lessons, or turning off technology and living in the moment for a whole week, or having an impact on a stranger's life, they will have a deep satisfaction that, by just being there, they changed people's lives in positive ways.

Third Sunday of Lent, March 3, 2024 Written by Rev. Dr. Alf Halvorson

The Vines that Choke Out Life: Unhealthy Eyes Ma

Matthew 6:22 NRSV

This is the third in our Lenten Series on the supposedly littler sins that can cause big problems in our lives. Or, as Solomon wrote about it in Song of Solomon 2:15, "Catch the foxes, the little foxes, that ruin the vineyards." Today we focus on our eyes. Jesus thinks that what we focus on or possibly what is going on inside our lives will influence what we see or how we see. Do we have sound eyes or unhealthy eyes? And how might what we see change from darkness to light?

- 1. Physically, are your eyes strong or weak? Do you need glasses or contacts to correct your vision? Think about going to the eye doctor. Do you see that doctor visit as positive or negative?
- 2. Read Matt. 6:22-23. In this short paragraph, Jesus is trying to say something helpful and profound to us. What do you think He is getting at with these words? What questions do you have from the way he said what He said?
- 3. Read Matthew 5:27-28 and Psalm 119:36-37. How do these verses help either with needed context for Jesus' words or an illustration of what He is saying?
- 4. If you look at Matthew 6:19-21 and 6:24-33, these verses provide the direct context in which our verses (vs. 22-23) are sandwiched. What does Jesus's conversation about treasures (money & stuff) have to do with His discussion about eyes? When we worry about what we will eat or drink or what we will wear, how are we demonstrating that we have distorted eyes? In verse 26, why are we supposed to *look* at the birds of the air? In verse 28, why are we supposed to *consider* (view) the lilies of the field? How does verse 33 produce *healthy eyes* as opposed to unhealthy eyes?
- 5. I shared a story about the low tire pressure indicator coming on in my car and having to solve that problem early on Monday morning. But because I didn't start my day as usual, I was unusually short with and insensitive to the lady who delivers our Houston Chronicle each day. My eye was darkness. Why and how does our devotional life, or worship or prayer life, give us perspective and help us have healthy eyes as opposed to unhealthy ones? How can you "seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness" each day so that your eyes are clear and not distorted?
