Palm Sunday, March 24, 2024 Written by Rev. Dr. Alf Halvorson

The Vines that Choke Out Life: Stopping Halfway Matthew 22:1-7 NRSV

This is the sixth Sunday in Lent, and we are on the brink of Holy Week. Dan and Rachel have advanced the series beautifully while I was away leading a group from MDPC in the Footsteps of Paul and the Churches of Revelation in Turkey. And now we look at our final *vine that chokes out life* from our Lenten Series on this Palm Sunday.

- 1. What are your Lenten, Holy Week, and Easter traditions? Do you need to drop something, perhaps, or add something to increase meaning or show commitment to Christ this holiest of weeks?
- 2. Read Matthew 22:1-7 and, if you have time, all the way through verse 14. What are your initial impressions and questions from reading this challenging parable?
- 3. How does reading Matt. 21:33-45, the Parable of the Wicked Tenants and Jesus' commentary afterwards, help you know what Jesus is trying to communicate in this similar parable in Matt. 22? It appears Jesus is doubling His thoughts to try to reinforce the message, so His readers do not miss the point.
- 4. Luke 14:15-24 has our same parable from Matt. 22, with a little more commentary of why certain people made excuses, begged off, took lightly the great banquet, and missed it. What were the excuses listed in Matthew and Luke? Are they good ones? Are they excuses of busyness, different priorities, or something else? How can "The good" get in the way of "The best" in our lives? Do you think the guests who said "yes" initially to the general invitation intended to go to the party when the specific time was given or did they never intend to attend in the first place?
- 5. Thomas G. Long, in his commentary on this passage, says that the first readers would have known that "the king is God; the son is Jesus; the marriage feast is the great marriage feast of the Lamb of God at the end of time (see Matt. 8:11 and Rev. 19:9); the slaves are the prophets; those invited are Israel; violence is Israel's rejection of the prophets; the destroyed city is the fall of Jerusalem in A. D. 70; the other invitees are the gentiles, tax collectors, prostitutes, etc., and the wedding garment in verse 11 is the Christian life (see Col. 3:12)." If that is true, why would anyone miss the biggest party ever thrown in the history of the world, with the most important person(s) in the universe as the host (God) and groom (Jesus)? Verse 4 says the calves have been slaughtered and everything is ready. It is the party to end all parties; and joy is to be prominent there. How could anyone "make light" (vs. 5)? Looking at the first Holy Week, how did many "make light" of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem and His resulting death on the cross? How could the crowd on Palm Sunday say "Hosanna" but on Good Friday switch to, "crucify Him"? How might you and I "make light" of what God is offering us in the way of worship, fellowship, discipleship, service, growth, generosity opportunities, grace, and salvation? But how might we, this year, repent, recommit, and then be able to rejoice by entering into the joy of the Resurrection celebration to come? It's not too late for us to still attend the party.
