SERMONNOTES

UnExpected: The Poor • Matthew 5:1-3 NRSV

This is the first in our post-Easter sermon series on the Beatitudes. In the last part of Matthew chapter four, the text says, "Jesus went throughout Galilee, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the good news of the Kingdom and curing every disease and every sickness among the people. So, His fame spread throughout all Syria, and they brought to Him all the sick, those who were afflicted with various diseases and pains, demoniacs, epileptics, and paralytics, and He cured them. And great crowds followed Him from Galilee, the Decapolis, Jerusalem, Judea, and from beyond the Jordan." (Matt. 4:23-25) Why didn't Jesus just stay a miracle worker and healer? Why provide the monumental teaching that became known later as The Sermon on the Mount? Well, perhaps because healing others is reactive more than pro-active. The problem has already caused great damage and distress. But with groundbreaking and foundational teaching, perhaps Jesus believed that He could form disciples, apprentices, that modeled the way of the Kingdom that would bring new life to those who put the message into practice and be life-giving to others as well.

- 1. Have you ever heard a speech, listened to a message, or put into practice a talk that changed your life? Was it by a parent, friend, professor, or someone else?
- 2. Read Matthew 5:1-11; but focus especially on the first two verses. Where did Jesus give His famous message? Who is the "them" in verse two? Is it just the disciples, or is the crowd allowed to overhear? See Matt. 7:28-29 for clarification. Does it matter who the audience is? Consider that the disciples are "typical Christians," the initiated; and that the crowd are "potential disciples." When have you been the crowd and when have you been a disciple?
- 3. Read verse 3. Of the nine beatitudes, only verse 3 and verse 10 have the blessing as a present reality. The other blessings are future-oriented. Do you have a guess as to why some blessings might be experienced in the here and now, and why some might require fulfillment in the future? What might that say about your Christian life? Do we experience all the blessings while we go through certain challenges, or is the fruit in some cases only eaten after the fact? Why or why not?
- 4. I defined the word "blessing" and the phrase "poor in spirit" in my sermon. Did those definitions fit what you expected them to be or surprise you? Clarify and discuss.
- 5. What would it look like for you to be "poor in spirit"? As I said in my message, how might reading, pondering, praying, and trying to live Psalm 23 this week help you to the blessed life, to living out being "poor in spirit"?
