Week 19 Question: Is there any way to escape punishment and be brought back into God's favor?

Answer: Yes, to satisfy His justice, God Himself, out of mere mercy, reconciles us to Himself and delivers us from sin and from the punishment for sin, by a Redeemer.

Scripture: Yet it was the will of the Lord to crush him with affliction. When you make his life an offering for sin, he shall see his offspring and shall prolong his days; through him the will of the Lord shall prosper. Isaiah 53:10 NRSV

SERMONNOTES

UnExpected: The Merciful • Matthew 5:7 NRSV

In our fifth sermon in our post-Easter series on the Beatitudes of Jesus, Clay focuses on "God blesses those who are merciful, for they will be shown mercy." (NLT). Showing mercy seems a pretty simple Christian virtue to understand from this week's Beatitude. Who doesn't think Christianity is wrapped up in mercy? Then the unspeakable happens, and mercy is the very last thing on our minds. So let's explore with the sermon how Jesus unfolds the amazing, unexpected blessedness of being merciful.

- 1. Clay notes that being merciful is at the forefront of what people (Christian and non-Christian alike) expect from Christianity. What biblical passages in Luke and Matthew does he enlist to support this contention?
- 2. The last Scripture Clay references in his support in question #1 is Matthew 18:21-35. Focus on this passage. What stands out to you about it? Discuss how and why it's so truthful to human experience and yet so difficult to cope with at the same time.
- 3. Clay states that most people who say mercy is easy to grant never had to be merciful when the "unspeakable" (Clay's word for the worst thing) happens. He states further that many, if not most, of us have experienced something we describe as unspeakable. What in your life's history or present experience makes it so you struggle today with mercy about it? (You don't have to share the details with anyone if you'd rather not.) Think specifically about how and why that experience(s) makes mercy really hard for you.
- 4. Despite our strong discomfort with it, Jesus is pretty clear in Matthew 5:7 and throughout the Gospels: there is a major connection between our forgiveness by God and our forgiveness of others. What is the connection, and what does this connection reveal about both God and us?
- 5. In addition to being merciful being hard to do, Clay also comments that being merciful requires personal courage. How so? What support for this does Clay provide? What step of courage might you be called to take as it relates to showing mercy?
- 6. Finally, Clay advocates that being merciful is truly life-transforming as we seek to follow Jesus. In what ways does being merciful change us from the people we were/ are into the people God desires us to become?
- 7. What step toward mercy do you need to take today? Toward God? Toward sharing God's mercy? How is the Holy Spirit working in your mind and heart at this time?
