UnExpected: The Persecuted • Matthew 5:10-12 NRSV

This is the eighth and final in our post-Easter Beatitudes Series from Matthew's Gospel. Some scholars say verse nine is the eighth beatitude and verse 10 is the ninth; but I am just combining these verses and beatitudes because they both deal with persecution, suffering, pain, and trials for those who follow Jesus.

- 1. When, if ever, have you seen someone suffer for their faith in Christ? Have you ever experienced trouble or persecution because of your fidelity to Jesus? Why do you think that the Christian faith has grown the most in times of trials and tribulation?
- 2. Read Matt. 5:10-12. Is Jesus saying that if we are merciful, pure in heart, and peacemakers, that we will be persecuted? Are the phrases/words 'for righteousness' sake' and 'falsely' significant? Discuss.
- 3. Why do you think Jesus moves to the second person 'you' and 'your' in verses eleven and twelve? Is that comforting to you that Jesus gets that personal and intimate or troubling to you? Why or why not?
- 4. I shared that New Testament Scholar, Dale Bruner, says that there are seven commands by Jesus in the rest of Matthew chapter five after the Beatitudes that will probably result in suffering for Christians. Here is his quote: In obedience to Scripture, we will be called factious; in seeking reconciliation, called cowards; in struggling for sexual purity, considered Puritans; in fidelity to our marriage partners, called foolish or out of date; in speaking only the truth, considered obstructionists; in responding non-violently to provocation, called disloyal; and in loving enemies, considered traitors. Is he right? And are there other circumstances or issues that might cause persecution of Christians today?
- 5. I shared in my sermon the circumstances behind the deaths of Stephen--the first Christian Martyr in Scripture, Polycarp, Apostle Peter, Bartholemew, William Tyndale, and Thomas a Becket. I shared about what happened to Christians in Nigeria recently. I shared the Scriptures 2 Tim. 3:10-12, I Pet. 2:19-21 & 4:12-16, 2 Cor. 1:3-7, and Heb. 11:32-12:3. What did those word and examples teach you about Christian persecution? And how can you 'rejoice and be glad' if something unpopular happens to you because of your faith?
- 6. What is your overall takeaway from the words of Jesus in Matt. 5:1-12 and his life, death, and resurrection for you?
