Unshakable Truth • Romans 1:19-23 & Matthew 19:16-22 ESV

This is the third week in our 14-week summer series on the major themes of The New City Catechism. Throughout the history of the church, Christians have used catechism—collections of questions and answers designed for contemplation and memorization—to teach the core doctrines and ideas of the faith. This week we look at Q's 7-15 in The New City Catechism, which focuses on the law. What is the purpose of the law? Can anyone keep the law of God perfectly? Since no one can keep the law, what is the purpose? During Jesus' earthly ministry, He was challenged by an expert in the law who asked, "which is the greatest commandment?" Jesus' response was simple: love God and love your neighbor. Jesus did not come to abolish the law. He came to fulfill it. As we learn to love like Jesus, we too will fulfill the law. "Let no debt remain outstanding, except the continuing debt to love one another, for whoever loves others has fulfilled the law."

- 1. In Matthew 22:36-40, Jesus gives us the two greatest commandments: Love God and love neighbor. Jesus says that "all the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments." There are 613 commands in the Torah (the first five books of the Old Testament). The Ten Commandments are the foundation of those commandments. In what ways do the two greatest commandments sum up the totality of the law?
- 2. Look at the ten commandments in Exodus 20:1-17. These commands call us to love God and love our neighbor. Which of the Ten Commandments do you think is lost in our culture? Which of the Ten Commandments do you personally need to focus on in your life?
- 3. Calvin and Luther spend considerable time discussing the Law. Calvin had a more positive view of the law than Luther. Both of them believed the law had a pedagogical use much like a mirror. The law helped expose our sin and need for God. John Calvin said the law helps us to "dismiss the stupid opinion of [our] own strength" and "flee to God's mercy." How have you seen this in your own experience?
- 4. Calvin believed the principle use of the law was meant for believers. The law guides believers to know and live out God's will. In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus used this pattern: "You heard that is was said, but I tell you..." Jesus takes the Ten Commandments and calls His disciples to the heart of the law. Luke discusses the difference between an external locus of control and an internal locus of control. Why is this distinction important in living out God's will?
- 5. Like Jesus, we are called to fulfill the law of Christ. Galatians 6:2 says, "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way **you will fulfill the law of Christ**." Can you think of someone in your sphere of influence that is burdened? What would it look like for you to help carry their burden?
