

Unshakable Truth • Ephesians 2:1-10 ESV

We continue our summer sermon series on the New City Catechism with the seventh installment this week. A catechism is a question-and-answer document (not unlike a FAQ) written to instruct children, new believers, and old-timers alike in the basics of the Christian faith. The six questions we consider this week are about faith, grace, works, and sanctification. The answers set our attention on the gratuitously abounding mercy, grace, and benevolence of our awesome God. Once understood, our response can be nothing else but a life lived in full surrender and gratitude.

- 1. Where do you go when you have questions about the Bible, theology, doctrine, or how God is calling us to live? How do you know when a source is legitimate or misleading? How do you avoid the Burger King approach ("have it your way") to building a biblical worldview?
- 2. Consider your days before you were a Christian (or if you were saved very young, consider your early days of following Jesus). Where do you see God's handiwork in getting your attention, drawing you to Jesus, and shaping you into a mature disciple?
- 3. Before reading the answer to Question 30, share or jot down your definition for "faith in Jesus." What level of difficulty did you have in forming that definition? What was hard or easy about it?
- 4. Now, read the answer to Question 30 and compare it to your definition(s). How did you do? What would you now change about your definition? Is there something missing from the catechism's answer?
- 5. Question 32 teaches that justification is defined by "declared righteousness" and sanctification is defined by "growing righteousness." What is the difference? Also, what does Questions 32 teach about the source or the cause of justification and sanctification?
- 6. Consider this quote from Dallas Willard in *Life without Lack*:
 - "Deny yourself and follow Christ, or deny Christ and follow yourself. Those are the options. . . If we are going to follow Christ and gain our real life, we must take up our own cross. That is, we must experience crucifixion. Crucifixion is an interesting thing. It is hard to do by yourself. In fact, it is impossible. . . The crucifixion of the self is a cooperative affair between us and the Lord" (143).
 - What is your first response to the quote? How does the crucifixion of the self relate to justification and sanctification? What can we learn from this quote about the relationship between grace and works?
- 7. There is a quote, often attributed to Jonathan Edwards (but never with a citation!) that goes: "The only thing you contribute to your salvation is the sin which made it necessary." I've heard people ask questions like these in response to this quote: If salvation is "through faith," then isn't faith something we contribute to salvation? Is having faith a "work"? How can we bring faith to the table, so-to-speak, while not contributing something to our salvation? How would you respond to these questions based on the answers of Questions 30-35?
