

Week 40 Question: What is the Lord's Praver? Answer: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be Your Name, Your Kingdom come, Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

Who's in Charge Here? • Esther 5:1-8:2 NLT

We come to the pivotal section of the book of Esther. As we consider these chapters, we do well to take the advice of The Bible Project: "Esther is a curious book in the Bible because God is never mentioned, not once. This may strike you as odd because the Bible is supposed to be a book about God. However, this is a brilliant technique by the anonymous author. It's an invitation to read the story looking for God's activity, and there are signs of it everywhere." ("Guide to the Book of Esther," <u>https://bibleproject.com/guides/book-of-esther/</u>)

- 1. The sermon begins with Clay making a case for importance of Story ("with a capital S," he says) in the Bible. What does this say about how God chooses to reveal Himself to us?
- 2. The first portion of the sermon comes from Esther 5:1-14 and is called "To Take a Chance." What chance-taking is referred to here? What are the consequences if things go horribly wrong?
- 3. Quoting a long-time colleague and mentor, Clay observes that sometimes we must take what he calls "faith-based risk" in order to be faithful to Jesus. What faith-based risk do you sense God is leading you to take now? If you're not sensing any riskiness in your faith walk, why not?
- 4. The second portion of the sermon comes from Esther 6:1-13 and is titled "The Invisible Hand of God." What unexpected, uncontrollable event turns everything upside down in the plot? How does this portion reveal God's subtle yet profound presence and activity?
- 5. Clay comments that while sometimes God works in our lives visibly, most of the time God's work is occurring "invisibly, silently, subtly, stealthily," and often we don't discern it until later. How is this true in your life? What do you look back upon in your life and see God's presence and activity with the clarity of hindsight?
- 6. The third portion of the sermon comes from Esther 6:14—8:2 and is described as "Justice Is Served... At Least in Part." What resolution to our plot, although not complete, gives some indication of justice being served?
- 7. As the sermon comes to its close, Clay describes briefly two events from a recent mission trip with the Outreach Foundation to Germany. What are they? How does the first event acknowledge the "banality of evil" (Hannah Arendt)? How does the second one express the victory and sovereignty of God through Jesus Christ, the Crucified and Risen Lord?
