

An Artful Advent: The News • Matt. 1:18-25 & Luke 1:26-38 NRSV

This is the first in our Advent/Christmas Series on the great texts of this season visually represented by some of our members who are artists. This will help us approach what might be familiar ground from a new vantage point. Sometimes, what we see depends on where we stand. Aristotle said, "The aim of art is to represent not the outward appearance of things, but their inward significance." May we see other dimensions to this world-changing story of God's Good News through our various artist's renderings.

- 1. Are you more right brain or left brain in the way you engage the world and God? Are you more rational or more artistic? What art forms intrigue or speak to you or for you? Painting, film, sculptures, music (singing or instrumental), etc.?
- 2. Read Luke 1:26-38 & Matt. 1:18-25. Angels appear to the two key characters, Mary and Joseph. How are these appearances similar and different? Who engages the angel and who does not? Does that strike you as odd or not? Do the messengers of God answer questions, explain themselves, and even give advice or must they simply be obeyed?
- 3. In the case of Joseph in Matt. 1:18-25, why doesn't he need to be afraid? And what is Joseph challenged to do? What is so powerful and profound for us about the names to be given to the baby?
- 4. And in the case of Mary in Luke 1:26-38, what questions does she ask and what answers are given? And what does it take to get her to a positive response?
- 5. Mary's prayer in Matt. 1:38 is one of the most amazing responses to a call of God in all of Scripture. What does she say and not say? And how might Mary's prayer become our prayer this year? What would it take for you to say that kind of prayer to God in your own words and mean it to your toes? What *calling* or *opportunity to trust* or *decision to surrender* in some area of your life is right in front of you as a crossroads this year?
- 6. I said in my message, part of the Good News is not that we are fully faithful in our waiting, but that God is fully faithful in His coming. As God comes into our world and our lives this Christmas, how can we welcome Him with open arms and join Him in His kingdom work?
