SERMONNOTES

An Artful Advent: The Massacre of the Innocents • Matthew 2:13-23 NRSV

This is the sixth in our Advent & Christmas Series on the Christmas Story through Art. We will return to the story of the magi next Sunday, but in today's Scripture, the visitors from the East have just departed the home of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. An angel comes to Joseph in a dream instructing him to take the child and his mother and flee to Egypt because Herod is out to kill the child. Joseph obeys, and the young family is on the move again. Meanwhile, Herod's soldiers raid Bethlehem, killing children two-years old, and younger. What part could this tragedy play in the narrative of Christmas?

Pray: Ask the Holy Spirit to teach, guide, convict, and comfort through the Word of God today.

Share: Share with the group where you were on 9/11 (2001). Or maybe you weren't yet born when the terrors of that day happened. Either way, mention briefly your experience of learning about that tragedy.

Read Matthew 2:13-23:

- 1. When you hear of a tragedy or untimely loss even in the present day which are you more likely to question: a) God's love; b) God's power; c) God's goodness; d) none of the above?
- 2. Quotes from the Old Testament (**Hosea 11:1; Jeremiah 31:15**) are included in Matthew's telling of the birth narrative of Jesus to remind readers that God has brought Israel out of Egypt, and also out of Exile in Babylon. What similarities might there be between the Exodus, the Babylonian Captivity, and the nation of Israel during the Incarnation of Jesus?
- 3. The word for Nazareth is similar to the Hebrew word *netser*, translated "sprout," "shoot," or "branch." Moreover, in historical context *Nazarene* would have held the connotation of "despised" or "a nobody." Read **Isaiah 11:1-2; 53:2-6**. How does this help us understand Jesus' person, purpose, and plan?
- 4. When the topic of tragedy arises, do you tend to: a) ignore/deny it; b) prevent it; c) care for those suffering from it; d) allow it to erode your faith; e) discuss it with God; f) none of the above?
- 5. When Philip Yancey considers theodicy (the discussion of how God if both good and powerful could allow the existence of evil), he says: "I don't know why God allows for suffering. All I know is that God is on the side of the sufferer." How have you seen / heard this happen in your life, or the lives of others?
- 6. Make a comment on the following quote by Henri Nouwen. What stands out to you? "Every time we see someone in pain and we wonder how that person is going to live through it, know that God suffered that pain and is suffering that pain with that person. In a way, the whole of human history is the showing of the depths of God's suffering. From a Christian perspective, history is the unfolding of the intensity and immensity of God's suffering, but also of God's resurrection, because in the midst of all the suffering, you can see signs of hope again and again and again."
- 7. Compare/contrast Jesus and Herod: In what ways do they use power differently? How might this offer perspective for today?
