SERMONNOTES

Words of Woe • Matt. 23:16-22

This is the third in our Lenten series (including Ash Wednesday) on Matthew chapter 23 and Jesus' challenging words there to the scribes and Pharisees. Like a piano teacher who says to a student sitting next to her on the bench, "Woe to them outside playing instead of practicing like you," Jesus wants to talk to His disciples and the crowd about the mistakes of the scribes and Pharisees so that they might learn from other's mistakes and be grow in faithfulness. We ponder their sin so we are aware of what sent Jesus to the cross; and also, so we might repent ourselves.

- 1. Do you know anyone who is blind physically or only has partial sight? What challenges do they face each day? And how do they overcome those limitations? Can they do it alone?
- 2. Have you ever been called "blind"? What was your accuser attacking you about, if you can remember? Or have you ever called someone blind? What were you attacking?
- 3. Read Matt. 23:16-22. What is Jesus' big complaint here about the scribes and Pharisees? Why does He call them blind three times (in vss. 16, 17, and 19)?
- 4. In my sermon, I tried to explain how "swearing oaths" worked in Jesus' day. What was helpful from that discussion? Was there anything confusing? Discuss as a group.
- 5. How did my discussion at the beginning of my message about the surgeon who developed cataract surgery and John Calvin's explanation of Jesus (and God's inspired Word) as the lens through which we see ourselves and the world make sense to you? From that discussion, have you had your spiritual cataract surgery? Has it helped you to see 20/20? If not, what roles can friends, our faith community at MDPC, and the Holy Spirit play so we see more clearly going forward? Pray for each other regarding clearer vision, less blind spots, and more depth perception and peripheral vision so we can follow, love, and serve God and the world more effectively.
