SERMONNOTES

You Will Live • Romans 8

This is the first in our post-Easter sermon Series. How can we live in response to Christ's death and resurrection? What does the cross and empty tomb open up for us in the way of new life? These are questions asked and answered by Paul in his letter to the church in Rome. Many scholars and just ordinary Christians see Romans as Paul's opus, his most mature thought, and the clear teaching of the Reformation—salvation by grace through faith as opposed to salvation by works. And many acknowledge that Romans 8 is the center of this central book. We will walk through this important chapter in the Sundays in May so that we can cement what was accomplished on Good Friday and Easter in our lives and for our world.

- 1. Most Christians feel the frustration of Paul in chapter 7 of Romans when he says, "For I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate.... Wretched man that I am! Who will rescue me from this body of Death?" (Romans 7:15b; 24) When have you felt enslaved to sin? Or powerless to overcome some habit, addiction, or weakness of character?
- 2. Read Romans 8:1-17 but focus first on the initial four verses (8:1-4). How does Paul say we have been freed from sin and death? By whom? By what action? And how does the death of sinless Christ satisfy the law? Hint: I talked in my sermon about John Calvin's 'exchange principle.' Did that make sense and was it helpful? Why do you still sometime condemn yourself if God doesn't condemn you if you are 'in Christ?'
- 3. Read Romans 8:5-11. Paul explains two kinds of life; one lived in and for the flesh and one lived in and by the Spirit. According to Paul, how can our mindset influence which one we follow? How can we by faith set our mind on things that are above or invite the Spirit to dwell in us? And how did my quote from C. S. Lewis provide a helpful way to look at how our faith or lack of faith lead us toward a heavenly or hellish existence?
- 4. Read Romans 8:12-17. I talked about a few ways we can put to death the deeds of the body from a book by John Owens entitled, "The Mortification of Sin." Where could you apply this idea right now in your own life? And how did my discussion about believers becoming children of God through adoption by God give you encouragement, peace, and hope? And how does being a child of God and heir instead of a slave change everything for us if we embrace this crucial concept by faith?
